## SIXTIETH ANNUAL MEETING

The Society of the Evangelical Lutheran Institute for the Deaf, an association consisting of thirty-four congregations of Detroit and vicinity, which is fostering the work of this institute held its annual meeting on Monday, July 9th. In his opening address the Rev. E. C. Fackler, president of the association, basing his remarks on Luke 10:42, pointed out that our chief duty is "Service," illustrated in the story of Mary and Martha. From Mary "who sat at Jesus feet and heard His Word" we are to learn, if our work is to meet with divine approval, we must make the Word of God the fountain of our inspiration and activity, the goal of our service. Our foremost aim must ever be to teach the deaf lambs of Jesus the "One thing needful," to lead them into the paths of righteousness. From Martha who

manifested her faith by ministering to the temporal needs of the Savior we learn how to show forth our faith in good works, by ministering also to the physical needs of our deaf children who are largely dependent upon our charity. The association was encouraged to continue its good work.

The association realizing the necessity of giving our deaf children the very best education possible resolved to equip our institute with a Sonotone, an electrical hearing device which will be a great help in teaching speech and language to the deaf. The Board of Directors was instructed to put forth every effort to raise \$600.00, the sum necessary for this device. Donations for this purpose from the friends of the handicapped deaf children will be highly appreciated.

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The treasurer's report showed that, due to strict economy and the increasing receipts from the friends of our institute, we were able to meet all our expenses without incurring an additional deficit. We acknowledge this with a deep sense of gratitude to our heavenly Father, and to our many friends who so loyally have supported our cause we say, Thank you!

Due recognition was given to the Ladies' Aid for the Deaf for their fine spirit of cooperation and their splendid services rendered to our institute also during the past year. God bless our Ladies' Auxiliary!

# "JESUS"

The above picture was taken by a Detroit Free Press reporter at the occasion of our Sixtieth Anniversary celebration held June 10th of this year. It depicts a group of our deaf pupils in the act of signing the name of IESUS. The word is "spoken" by first placing the middle finger of the right hand in the center of the palm of the left hand and then placing the middle finger of the left hand in the center of the palm of the right hand. The sign thus made reminds us of the wounds in the hands of our Lord caused by the nails which affixed Him to the cross. Surely, a most appropriate manner by which to be reminded of the bitter suffering of our Savior for the sins of the world.

However, our deaf children not only learn to speak the sweet name of JESUS in the sign language, but also learn to speak His name with their vocal organs, and above all, they learn to love Him and believe in Him as their only Savior. Truly, it is a most glorious work which our dear Lutheran Church is supporting at our Lutheran Institute for the deaf in order that its "Children of Silence," too, may be brought to the blessed knowledge of their Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

On September 5th, our Institute will begin its new school year. Present indications are that we shall have a very large enrollment of new pupils this year. To date children have been announced from New York, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, and Canada. But there are many more who should be in this their Christian school. # THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR OF THE LUTHERAN INSTITUTE FOR THE DEAF OPENS Wednesday After Labor Day, September 5th, 1934.

The purpose of the Institute is to give all Lutheran and other deat and hard of hearing chil-

dren a proper secular and religious education and training.

The course comprises the teaching of the English language, arithmetic. hygiene, drawing, penmanship, geography, history, and the teaching of the chief Bible doctrines preparatory for confirmation and communicant church membership. The school employs the oral method of instruction, teaching speech and lip-reading to all deaf capable of learning it. The manual method and writing are used for such as are unable to learn to speak and speech-read.

The course consists of Kindergarten, one year pre-grade work, and six years of grade work.

The Institute is open to all healthy deaf and hard of hearing children whose parents desire a

truly Christian education and training for them in home-like environment.
