THE SIGNIFICANCE OF LENT

OUR NEW BUILDING

Our new girls' dormitory unit, the building which was begun in June of last year, is completed. Not a single mishap occurred throughout the course of its erection. For this we are truly grateful to the Lord. The building was designed by architect, Mr. Walter Maul, and erected by the Henry Martens Construction Co. Both Mr. Maul and Mr. Martens, are members of Lutheran churches in Detroit.

On February 9th the new unit will be formally opened with a short prayer service conducted by our president, the Rev. E. C. Fackler. After the service the building will be open to our friends for inspection.

The architect's description of the new home is as follows:

"The building is located within twelve feet east of the present building and both are connected by means of

a ramped and covered passageway, so that the children can attend school and the dining room without exposure to outside climatic conditions. It covers an area of 43 feet and 6 inches deep by 106 feet and 6 inches long, is two stories in height and has a complete basement. The construction is fire-proof throughout consisting of concrete floors and roof and all walls of masonry block, wood being used only for windows and doors. It will comfortably house 35 children besides providing living quarters for two teachers on the first story and for the matron and a teacher on the second story.

"The first story contains a medium-sized study room for the use of the younger children, while a large-sized room will be used for play and study space for older ones. Each of these rooms has cabinets to provide storage space for toys, games, books and other equipment. Another large-sized roof with connecting closet will be used for the teaching of sewing. Locker rooms with individual storage space will provide each child with a place to hang her every day clothes. Adequate wash room and toilet facilities are provided. A room with connected bath will be the living quarters for two teachers. An airy and sunny hospital room with its own bath will isolate the sick and indisposed children. A combined kitchen and first aid room, properly equipped, will provide means of aid to the hospital room and to all other rooms in general without necessitating passage to the old building.

"The second story has seven dormitory rooms with sleeping accommodations for 35 children. Each child will have a separate cabinet for the storage of her clothes. Ample bath, wash, and toilet facilities will take care of hygiene. For the storage of clothes, bedding, etc., a large store room is provided with the necessary shelving. Two rooms with connected bath will be the living quarters for the matron and a teacher.

"The basement provides space for a large play room to be used by the children during inclement weather. It also provides space for the boiler plant and fuel storage. A portion also is planned with separate toilet facilities for men and women whenever our grounds are used for festival purposes.

"This new building is intended for the housing of the girls. The complete new Institute, as now proposed, provides for a similar building for boys on the west side of the old building, a school and administration office in the center, on the site of the old building, and a chapel extending to the front."

Our girls will be very happy to move into these modern, well-equipped quarters provided for them. Their going will greatly relieve the overcrowded condition in our old building which will still serve as our boys' dormitory and administration building.

MY APPENDICITIS OPERATION

For several days last December I had a pain in my right side. At first it did not hurt very much, but after awhile Dr. Hugeli, our school doctor, examined me and then talked to our matron, Miss Theilmann. Later she told me that I had appendicitis and must go to the

In the afternoon, Mr. Klein took me to the Deaconess Hospital. I was a little frightened. He gave me a prayer book and said, "Do not be afraid. God will take care of you." The nurse told me to get into bed. It was higher than our beds at school. Then the doctor came into the room. He said that they could not operate at once because I had a bad cold.

Four days later my cold was gone. A man pushed a hospital cot on wheels into my room and told me to lie on it. The elevator took us upstairs to the operating room. A nurse and a doctor in a white coat stayed in the room. The doctor stuck a long needle into my back and my body became numb. It felt funny. Then a towel was put over my eyes. I did not feel the opera-

After the operation, I stayed in bed for eleven days. At first my side hurt very much and I could not sleep. The nurse gave me hypodermics. Then I felt better. I did not eat for several days. Mr. Klein, Miss Theilmann, Miss Beckemeier, Mr. Bethman, and several of my deaf friends came to visit me. Mr. Klein's pastor, Rev. H. Olsen, also visited me and gave me a nice prayer book.

On the twelfth day I sat in a wheel chair. That afternoon Mr. Bellhorn came and took me back to school. I am very happy to be back and I thank God for making me well again.—By Clifford Schaeg.
