

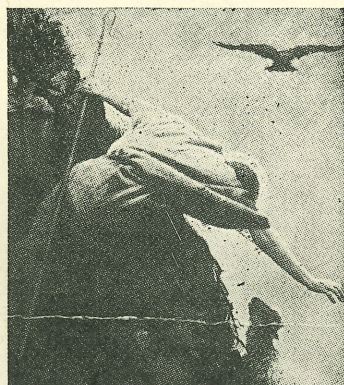

SING—WE DEDICATE

May 10 is Cantata Sunday. Cantata means Sing. "O sing unto the Lord a new song; for he hath done marvelous things." Ps. 98, 1.

May 10 is the date of the dedication of our new dormitory for girls at our School for the Deaf in Detroit. Dedicatory services will be conducted, God willing, in the afternoon at 3 o'clock. Pastor R. Heschke of Hilbert, Wis., will deliver the English sermon, and Pastor O. Riess of Bethany Church, Detroit, will preach in the German language. The Rev. E. C. Fackler, president of the Society for the School, will preside at the services.

We sing unto God that we have been privileged to erect this wonderful new building for our girls as a first unit of an entirely new building project for our School. Messrs. Walter Maul and Henry Martens, those faithful fellow-Lutherans who served as our architect and contractor, deserve every credit for giving us this beautiful and serviceable building at the very fair price of \$41,500. Above all things, God gave us His blessing, so that the construction could proceed without a mishap or interruption. Our Ladies' Aid Society rendered invaluable services in furnishing the building. February 9, a zero-weather day, the dormitory was formally opened with a divine devotion, and has been in use since. Now that we may expect pleasant weather, May 10th, we hope that you all, who read this and are able, will come to the dedication. Weather permitting, we should have a large attendance from near and far at this service.

But there is another thing for which we sing praises to God. We have an unparalleled enrolment in our School. Even though we just completed this new building, we are practically filled up. About fifty children have made our School their refuge for learning "the one thing needful," the Word of God, and other things useful, whatever they need for this earthly life. Indeed, the Lord hath done marvelous things!

At this time, however, we again plead with all our friends to send us the names and addresses of all Lutheran deaf children of whom they may know, so that we can get in touch with them in order to try to gain them for our School. We are not so overcrowded that we cannot take care of your deaf child and of your friend's deaf child. When we have no more room, we shall make more room.

Sing praises to God by helping us dedicate our new dormitory on May 10 and by sending us every name and address of deaf children that you may know. Our School is here to give every Lutheran deaf child a Christian education.

THE HARD-OF-HEARING CHILD

Concerning the hard-of-hearing child, Superintendent Elstad of the Minnesota School for the Deaf, in the "Companion" of February 20th among other things says: "We must take care of the hard-of-hearing child. He doesn't belong in schools for the hearing. We are glad to do what we can for these children and the least we can do is to give them the opportunity to use available hearing aids."

A child handicapped with impaired hearing is often wrongfully classed as mentally deficient. Taught the art

of lip-reading and instructed with the aid of a good hearing device, such children can be given the opportunity in education and life to which they are entitled. We have several such hard-of-hearing children in our school who, while attending hearing schools made no progress at all and as is customary in such cases, developed an inferiority complex. These same children are now advancing normally in their studies and what is more, they are regaining confidence in themselves, and life no longer is dreary and hopeless to them.

All Lutheran hard-of-hearing children should be sent to our Lutheran Institute for the Deaf. Here such children are taught by methods adapted to their needs which include the use of a very efficient hearing aid. They are instructed in all secular subjects taught in regular hearing schools and in addition thereto, receive the necessary religious training in preparation for confirmation and church membership.

Pastors and teachers should send us the names and addresses of all hard-of-hearing and deaf children in their congregations in order that we may contact their parents with the view of gaining such children for our school.

Doing this will not only give you the pleasure of conversing with your deaf child, but will also aid the child to retain what it has learned and will give him

practice in reading your lips and thus enable him to more and more take part in the family social life. Please talk to your child and encourage him to talk to you.

We wish your children happy hours at home and pray that the Lord's guardian angels may protect them and safely guide them back to us next September for further mental and spiritual development.
