

# Many Children Go Home

The Christmas holiday is at our door, but there has been an air of Christmas around for quite some time, and the question the children are asking one another most frequently is "Are you going home for Christmas?"

Our children look forward to Christmas from early fall, not because they want to get away from school, but because they want to go home. Home, parents, and Christmas go hand in hand. That's the way the grown folks feel, and it's more than true with children.

Those of our children who live reasonably close to school go home for their vacation while the children who live too far from school or have no homes remain here. Those who remain miss the Christmases they have known at home (occasionally a little one steals off in a corner with misty eyes) but they are a jolly group Christmas eve when they assemble around a pretty tree to open the gifts they have received from their friends and loved ones. When you are a long way from home, especially around a holiday when everyone rejoices it's a fine feeling to know that there are friends who think of and remember you.

We do not want our readers to think that vacation days are gloomy here. Mr. Klein and the staff try to make vacation days as pleasant as possible for those remaining. The routine of school days is not followed and everyone is allowed to stay up a little later in the evening and to sleep later in the morning which makes everyone happy.

# Christmas at the Institute

Christmas Program

During the past year children from various parts of the country have written to our pupils and asked what kind of Christmas service we have for our school. In answer we want to tell them that our annual Christmas service is no different from that of Sundayschool and Day Schools for hearing children with the only exception that our children do not sing the Christmas carols as hearing children do. Our children recite the Christmas story in questions and answers, speak recitations and Bible verses pertaining to the story

and sign the Christmas carols while the hearing pupils of the congregation in whose church our service is held sing them. This signing of the hymns is very gracefully done and adds much to beautify the service.

#### Services of St. Stephanus Church

This year our service will be held on December 18 at 7:00 P.M. in St. Stephanus Church of which the Reverends H. Brauer and Wm. Hagen, Jr., are the pastors. The service is always held on the Sunday before Christmas and just before many of our children leave to spend the holidays with their loved ones at home. Friends of our school from all parts of Detroit come to this service and the church is generally filled to the very last seat.

Our children love this service and try their utmost to speak so well that all can understand them. To transport our large family to the place of worship the Detroit Street Railway System furnishes us several buses free of charge. We are very grateful for this service.

#### Distribution of Gifts

After the service at Church the children are returned to our home where they then receive gifts provided for them by our good Ladies' Aid Society. In former years each child besides receiving the customary candy, nuts, and oranges, also received another useful gift and toys. This year our children have volunteered to forego all presents in order that our good ladies may apply the money usually spent for such gifts for the furnishings of



our new building. That then is their personal contribution to our building program. Indeed a laudable act which shows a willingness to sacrifice for our much needed new home.

My dear Pastor Bernthal:

Our Lutheran Institute for the Deaf in Detroit, as far as I know the only school of its kind in Protestant circles in our country, is facing a crisis. The question is not whether it was feasible to build, or whether the building was condemned by the Detroit building authorities and that it was impossible to accept all of the applications for admission, so that many of the children would actually have been deprived of the blessings of this training and our entire mission to these underprivileged children would have been curtailed and eventually stopped unless the energetic and courageous building program now in progress be completed.

'I personally have the utmost confidence in the practical interest and support of our pastors and congregations; for I feel assured that once our Christians learn to know the manifold blessings which accompany our work and the dire need which is hampering the extension of our mission to the deaf children, they will respond with genuine gratitude for the privilege of participating in this blessed work. Under their leadership our laity has always accepted such great opportunities for spreading Christ's Kingdom, and they will show a happy response in thie orisis.

Toledo, Ohio

Dear Director Klein:

Your letter for funds for your new building was received some time in May. Since the school did nothing for you, I decided to make a collection in the Sunday-school. I gave each pupil and teacher a wooden barrel bank which they kept for five Sundays. On the second Sunday one girl of the first grade brought her bank and said: "My bank is full. Please give me another." The first contained \$2.13 and her second \$1.10. The total collection was a great surprise to me. It amounted to \$40.50—about an average of 40 cents per pupil.
