We here at your Institute for the Deaf are in the shoes of such a businessman, and are face to face with such a problem. Our product—The Christian Training of Deaf Children—is it meritorious?—Besides all secular subjects we TEACH DEAF CHILDREN TO KNOW THEIR SAVIOR and become so enriched spiritually that, when they are sent out into the world, they are prepared to resist life's temptations with at least as much foundation as your child and mine. Except for this school, where could they be trained so efficiently in the precepts which are the first right of our hearing boys and girls, and which, surely, should not be denied to those unfortunate youngsters who are bereft of hearing and speech? Our FACTORY,— it is our school and dormitories—is now crowded to its utmost and able to provide for only a few more with the greatest of difficulties.

Step by step we can trace this parallel. Public appreciation—in this case Lutheran appreciation—is growing constantly. As we know, there are about equally as many deaf boys as girls in this country. Yet our enrollment shows 42 girls to 22 boys, which indicates to us that parents have held back their boys because we publicized the modern and safe home recently completed for our girls, and that if we might announce the completion of an equally modern boys' quarters, heavy increased enrollment would develop. Even today we dare not solicit as actively as we would like for fear that the state authorities might decide that we are overcrowded. Yet, dare we turn down any legimate applicant? Dare we tell a worried parent that no room can be found for his child, and that its learning years must be spent in a state or non-Lutheran school where no word of God, no Gospel of Jesus' love, will sprout its seed in the child's heart? Can you, dear fellow Lutheran, answer that we should? No, and neither can we.

A further parallel—the energetic efforts of faculty and staff—. Probably in no other school are such demands made on the patience of director, teachers, matron and assistants, and other help. Virtually this is a day and night undertaking. Long hours, kindly, persevering effort, tedious toil,—all these are needed if you would be a helper in God's vineyard for the deaf. Day-time study and teaching, preparation of meals, care of clothes, supervision of play, cleaning and scrubbing, night-time supervision of study and recreation, the children's baths, getting them safely into bed—all these are named in too brief a manner to indicate all that must be done. Yes, we can say that your workers, from top to bottom, are surely energetic.

We urgently need to expand. A new dormitory should be built so that the rooms in the school now used as the boys' sleeping quarters can be used for administration and class-room purposes. The many hungry mouths to be fed and the larger laundry,—all clothing and bedding is laundered weekly—require a new service building consisting of kitchen, dining-room, and laundry. This is an imperative need. Our present facilities are far short of sufficient to store and prepare food, to cook and bake, and to launder the clothes of our large family. These buildings, as you, dear reader, can guess, must be built as nearly fireproof as possible. Particularly so because we are being entrusted with children whose defect makes this precaution all the more needful. Plain substantial buildings, with no trimmings, suitable to house and school these children in homelike comfort, THAT IS OUR NEED.

The Association for the Deaf entrusted by the Church with this important phase of mission work is composed of most of the Lutheran churches of Detroit and vicinity. This association, being acquainted with the need, has instructed its Board of Directors to devise means to meet this emergency, and at this writing the Board is making plans, not only of buildings, but also of ways to provide the necessary capital. It is estimated that provide the necessary capital. It is estimated that about \$125,000.00 will be needed for the two buildings.

You, then, are the investor to whom we appeal. Have we in the foregoing paragraphs painted our situation clearly enough to cause you to say, "This is a growing business of the Lord. Here are active, willing, and untiring workers in His cause to whom I can entrust my donation, and here I can make an investment which will donation, and here I can make an investment which will repay as dividends a lifelong satisfaction that I have not heard unheeded the piteous appeal of the deaf child, and the command of their Savior?" May we hope that our story will not fall on deaf ears, and that you will give not only of your surplus, but will be willing to make at least a slight sagrifice that this noble work will make at least a slight sacrifice that this noble work will Your contributions should be not be interrupted? marked for the Building Fund of the Lutheran Institute for the Deaf and sent through the usual channels.

TEACHING LITTLE DEAF CHILDREN

By MISS LOUISE UPHAM

READING

Reading always holds a fascination for children, and our deaf children are no exception to the rule. Our approach is through Silent Reading, the understanding of print. We introduce print, almost as soon as the classes are formed. The child first learns to recognize his own name. He sees it printed at the top of his slate, on the back of his chair, above the hook on which he hangs his coat and on his clothing. He sees the names of the other members of the class and begins to recognize them.

As soon as the children have had the more difficult matching exercises involving form, and color, print is introduced as a

- A. 1. Matching letters—large size—letters cut out of bright colored paper and mounted on cards 5 x 6. (Using Plymouth Chart.) Color and form.
 2. Same—matching letters smaller in size mounted on cards 4½ x 5. Color and form.

 - Matching letters all one color—cards 5 x 6. Form.
 - Matching duplicates of letters on large board on which the whole alphabet has been printed. Small match-ing cards are hung on hooks below the letters printed

on the board.

The children become familiar with the letter forms and soon begin to pick out the letters in their own names and in other words they see.

- B. Large charts containing pictures of twelve or more objects with names of objects printed below the pictures on colored geometric forms. Charts made of masonite "Presswood" which is heavy enough to hold small cup hooks. On these hooks children hang the duplicate
 - Chart I. Matching for color and form and print.
 - Chart II. Matching for form and print.
 - 3. Chart III. Matching for print alone.
- C. As the names of pupils, nouns, commands, numbers, and colors, are learned in lip reading, the printed form is given.
 - Pupils learn to associate the object with the printed
 - Commands read from print and performed.
 - Recognition of the printed form of the colors.
 - Numbers.
 - Weather expressions recognized. Each morning the expression suitable to the weather is chosen from the following:
 The sun is shining.
 It is raining.
 The sun is not shining.
 It is snowing.

When these are understood in silent reading the children are ready for the "Play and Learn" books, or for any other work book containing a simple vocabulary and easy directions.

The teachers use the Rapid Chart Printer, the type of which is large and clear. Words are printed on Manila tag. Pictures are pasted on cards of uniform size.

Let us visit another room. The teacher gives the printed names of the children, her name, "father" and "mother" to Margaret. Mararet passes the right card to each child and to the teacher, and holds the words "father" and "mother" to their pictures on the wall.

Printed commands used as flash cards. Each child is shown a command or two and he quickly performs the action.

There are several Plymouth Charts around the room. In one, the colors, in another, pictures. Louise is given the print for the colors, Frances, the print for the pictures. They slip the printed words into the correct pockets on the charts,

Richard goes to the calendar chart (a modified Plymouth Chart). He looks over the printed slips, selects the following, and puts the sentences in the chart:

Today is Tuesday.

It is snowing.

TOPICS

Perhaps we should not call these modest beginnings topics. but from them the topic work develops. Some experience the class has had is printed on a chart with an appropriate picture by way of illustration, as:—a picture of the movie screen and printed below—We went to the movies. Charts such as this hang around the room and the children become familiar with them. While these serve primarily as printed topics, we use them in lip reading lessons. The teacher speaks—We had a party and a child points to that chart. She speaks—We went outdoors. We played ball. A child indicates the chart, and so on. Before long, our topics will consist of several sentences. This is one way our language work develops.

Before teaching the children to write we give a number of exercises to bring about better muscular co-ordination. At the slates the children have free hand drawings, and drawing under direction, following the teacher. Then the same sort of exercises at the tables using the beginners' pencils and large sheets of paper. Writing exercises follow.

We teach manuscript writing to the beginning classes. The children learn first to copy—later to express themselves in writing.

writing.

As soon as the children can write, some of their work is enclosed in the teachers' letters to parents. The children in one of the beginning classes recently sent home their first letter. To be sure it contained but three sentences, but from the responses we have received from parents, it would appear that these first efforts were very much appreciated.

We have pictures of children playing games; with toys; pictures of the playground apparatus and of various children's activities. We use these when the children come to school in the morning, for at this time they always wish to tell the teacher what they have done since they saw her the day before. John may point to a picture of boys playing ball, to the seesaw and the slide; Mary to a picture of a girl playing with her doll—to a girl jumping rope, and from this we realize they are telling us what they had done. A little later each child goes to his slate and draws—usually in straight lines, but from these simple drawings we usually have a pretty good idea of what the children have tried to express. As soon as the children have sufficient language they write an item, or several items, of news.

LANGUAGE WORK

As we are writing of the work of the entering group of children and what they are doing, or have done, up to the present time (February), we have but little to write under language work. The most mature of these children are beginning to have sentence work.
