our sins and our guilt. The sorrows of Gethsemane, the humiliation of Pilate's hall, the curse of Golgotha's tree—all of them he suffered for us.


Thy life was given for me, Thy blood, O Lord, was shed, That I might ransomed be And quickened from the dead. Thy life was given for me: What have I given for Thee?

We were also grieved by the passing of Mrs. J. F. Ruff of Port Huron, Michigan. In the last issue of the Deaf Child's Advocate, we reported the wonderful gift which she and her husband made to our building fund on the occasion of their golden wedding anniversary.

Another good friend of the Institute, whom the Lord saw fit to call home to heaven was Mrs. Lydia Stricker of E. Detroit, Michigan. Shortly before her passing Mrs. Stricker made a pledge of one thousand dollars to equip the dental room of our new building and all through her life she took an active interest in the welfare of the deaf boys and girls at our Institute.

We are deeply grateful to the pastors of the Northern Illinois District, who, under the leadership of President Rev. E. T. Lams, are leading Synod outside of Michigan in contributions for our new building. The congregation of President Lams heads the list with the largest contribution from Northern Illinois.

Many pastors have discovered that memorial wreaths for the building fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Institute for the Deaf have been eagerly sought by people of their congregations. We shall be glad to supply pastors with any needed amount of these memorial wreaths.

When we were in New York recently, we called on the pastors of the metropolitan area in the interest of our building fund. Every pastor without exception gave us a friendly reception and assured us of support for our building project. We appreciate their interest all the more since we know how difficult is the work of our brethren in the great Metropolis.

Only nine beds in the new Institute remain to be dedicated. The cost of dedicating a bed is one hundred dollars and such a gift will provide space for one child for many decades to come.

Our architect informs us that the cost of lockers in the new building will be \$325.00. A gift of \$50.00 will defray the cost of the lockers of one room. Are there some readers of the Deaf Child's Advocate who would be willing to supply this needed equipment?

Won't You Help Us Now?

There are still more than a thousand congregations of our Synod who have not as yet remembered us with a collection for our new building. 
