Duewecke and Peckham, eye specialists, examine our children's eyes periodically and prescribe proper glasses when such are needed. The services of the above mentioned professional men are all given gratis to our school. Parents of our children can, therefore, rest assured that their loved ones receive the very best of care in all respects without extra cost to them.

Congregation Grows

Our Savior Church for the Deaf is steadily growing. On the first Sunday in July four adults were received into membership through confirmation. The mission numbers over ninety communicant members. Because of the very nature of this work, sensational growth cannot be expected. But with a new building the membership will very likely reach the one hundred mark at an early date.

Members Are Scattered

The members live scattered over the entire city of Detroit. Quite a number live in the suburbs, in Roy-

al Oak, Berkley, Birmingham, Grosse Pointe, Roseville and River Rouge. Most of them travel a distance of ten miles or more to attend Sunday services. In spite of this handicap the average attendance for the summer was 89. Pastor Borchardt hopes that this average will improve when the new church is completed. He says, "The hope and wish expressed in prayer on the day of ground-breaking is the hope and wish of our congregation today, namely, that the Lord God will remain with our congregation in His Word and Sacraments also in our new church."

PAGING THROUGH THE VISITORS' BOOK

Six Hundred Visitors in June and July

The building of our new units at the Institute has certainly created a fine Synod-wide interest in our deaf children and their temporal and eternal welfare.

Paging through the visitors' registration book we note that during the months of June and July over six hundred people visited the Institute and inspected the new girls' dormitory and utilities building. Many were surprised to see the erection of the Administration Building and Chapel well under way. The six hundred do not include several thousand who passed through the beautiful entrance on the day of our annual festival without registering. It was interesting to find that Michigan is represented by more than forty different cities and towns throughout the state.

We were also honored with numerous visitors from Illinois, Ohio, York, Indiana, Missouri, New New Jersey, West Virginia, and California.

IN MEMORIAM

PROFESSOR GEORGE RITZMANN

Former Instructor of Institute Passes Away

Professor George Ritzmann, who served as teacher at our Lutheran Institute for the Deaf when this school was still in its infant years, passed away in Detroit on June 15, 1939, at the age of almost 83 years.

Teacher Ritzmann was born June 19, 1856, at Ft. Wayne, Indiana. After his instruction and confirmation in St. Paul's Lutheran Church by the sainted Dr. Sihler, he attended the Teachers' Seminary at Addison, Illinois, graduating in 1875.

Instructor at Detroit Institute

After his graduation, Teacher Ritzmann was called as instructor to our Institute for the Deaf in Detroit when this school was still in its infant years. Already in those early days our deaf children were taught by the oral method. Today this method of teaching is almost universally in use.

Served as Teacher and Professor

From 1888 to 1902, Teacher Ritzmann was in charge of the Teachers' Seminary Training School in Addison, Illinois. In 1902 he was called as Professor to our Teachers' College at Seward, Nebraska. Ill health caused him to resign from this office in 1907 to take a much needed rest. His last charge was at the Concordia School in Detroit where he served until his retirement in 1921.

Laid to Rest on His Eighty-third Birthday

In 1877 the departed was married to Marie Buckmann of Fraser, Michigan, who after 46 years of married life died in 1923. Of the nine children born to this union, five survive the father, four sons and one daughter. On June 19th, his eighty-third birthday, this faithful servant of the Lord was laid to rest after a funeral service at Concordia Church, in which Pastor Phil. H. Bohn, one of the directors of the Institute, preached
