PASTOR'S DEAF SON SUCCEEDS AS **MANUFACTURER**

Mr. Henry Ford has been very generous in his treatment of the deaf. He has given them ememployment in many lines of work. Mr. Leo Kuehn, the deaf son of the Rev. E. Kuehn, who had been working for about 12 years as a tool-expert in the Ford plant, desirous of helping others handicapped as himself, told a foreman about his plans. The foreman told Mr. Ford about these plans, and immediately Mr. Ford showed interest in the matter to such an extent that he offered to purchase all the water pump-pulleys Mr. Kuehn could produce, this being the special line of work Kuehn was interested in.

At present 28 deaf men are employed in pump-pulley making in Mr. Kuehn's factory, and they turn out one-half of the water pump-pulleys used on Ford automobiles, that is about 5,000 pulleys daily. Only one person in the plant can hear and speak.
