The sum collected spells real sacrifice on the part of our pupils since all of it comes out of their very meager spending money allowance In general, the children feel that buying stamps is more like giving than saving, because, ten years of waiting for repayment is practically a life-time according to their way of thinking. But even a lifetime is all right with them since Uncle Sam needs their help. They have the proper spirit.

At the present time the Junior Red Cross campaign is being conducted in our school. One sees posters and a milk bottle labeled with a large red cross in every classroom. Even before the needs of this worthy cause were fully placed before the various classes, copper, nickel, and silver covered the bottoms of many of the bottles. All want to be "a good Samari-

tan." We feel sure that when the Junior Red Cross drive comes to a close we can report that all classes went "over the top."

In all these endeavors our pupils stand ready to do their utmost to help bring this war to an end and alleviate suffering throughout the world.
