

Director John A. Klein

-Years of crisis and men to meet it-



That decade which began with 1920 was a real time of decision for the over half-a-century-old Lutheran Institute for the Deaf. Its building facilities were outmoded and condemned and funds were needed to replace the old Institute building with a modern structure.

In such times of crises our Heavenly Father always provides the times and the men to meet the needs. And so it was that the Rev. F. A. Hertwig was chosen to meet the challenge. At that time he was not only serving as pastor of Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Detroit but also as vice-president of the Michigan District. Today he is third vice-president of the Missouri Synod. Pastor Hertwig served as chairman of the building fund committee at that time, and under his leadership sufficient funds were raised to build the first unit in 1936, which is the present boys' dormitory.




The 30's that covered our nation with its pall of economic gloom cast its shadows over the Institute as well. School revenue tumbled as supporters felt the pinch of a depression and shadows grew longer and deeper when the venerable brick-frame structure that housed this school since 1873 was condemned as being a fire hazard and unsafe for deaf children.

But there were men who had faith in this great cause for the deaf and still greater faith in the miraculous ways of God. Such a man was the Rev. E. T. Bernthal, pastor of Epiphany Lutheran Church, one of Detroit's largest. In spite of depressing economic conditions he threw his talents, ingenuity and energy into an all out campaign and continued unceasingly until he had reached the goal of \$225,000.00 he had set for himself, a sum necessary to replace the condemned building. During this campaign he gave not only of himself but also the services of his office and staff as well. Through him Mr. W. Knudsen was moved to donate \$60,000 for our Gloria Dei Clara Elizabeth Knudson Chapel which he dedicated to his wife.

The publicity which, by the way, was considered most outstanding, was all planned by the Rev. Mr. Bernthal.

Recognition must also be given to the good wives who unselfishly allowed their husbands to devote so much of their free time to this work.

The buildings erected at that time were dedicated in May 1940 at which time Dr. Walter A. Maier was the guest speaker.

Because of the tireless efforts of the men pictured on this page and their helpers, this school now has a plant recognized as one of the finest home-schools of its size for deaf children in the United States.


