



A Brief History of the Ev. Luth Institute of the Deaf

In the year 1873 our forefathers, encouraged by the sainted Dr. C. F. W. Walther, established the Lutheran Institute for the Deaf, the first Protestant school of its kind in America. It was the Master's challenge "Feed My Lambs" which gave them the incentive to act. Friends of the deaf in those days were few and necessary material gifts were not easily obtained. These were real obstacles to this work of faith. But in spite of them, the original "Deaf Mute Institute" was constructed on a 20 acre plot of land in the then sparsely settled area called "Norris."

Year after year deaf children from far and near, besides receiving a secular education, were fed the "Bread of Life" within these walls under the guidance and supervision of consecrated directors, teachers and housemothers.

Personnel changes took place from time to time but the Institute's primary aim and objective, to rehabilitate and lead deaf children to their Savior, never changed.

The original Institute, a three-story brick building with its high glassed-in tower, stood as a land mark in Norris, later called North Detroit, for more than 60 years. It served both as home and school for the many deaf children who sojourned within its portals while they, due to their handicap, laboriously received an education and learned to know their Savior.

In the early 1930's, the influx of new pupils taxed the Institute's facilities to the limit. So in 1936 a boys' residence was constructed. Soon thereafter the safety authorities declared the old structure a fire hazard and condemned it. Remember, these were depression years. Nevertheless, the Association resolved to replace it with a modern fire proof school, chapel and girls' residence in order that it might continue to accept and serve the ever increasing number of applicants. This became a reality in 1938 and 1939 when our Christian friends throughout the length and breadth of our land rallied to the call of our very efficient building campaign manager and dear friend, the Rev. E. T. Bernthal, and provided the funds needed for this very costly but necessary expansion program.

1939 - 1949

At the completion of these units it was thought that they would provide sufficient facilities for all times. But hardly were the new buildings occupied, when a waiting list of new applicants closed our mouths to the words "yet there is room." Ever heeding the command of our Lord to feed His lambs, an addition to the boys' residence became a necessity and was built during the Institute's 75th Anniversary year. This latest unit, God willing, will be dedicated on Sunday, June 12th.

It is the Lord who through His Christians has continuously provided the school with its every need. Truly, He hath done all things well. To Him be all glory.


