Two new teachers, Miss Elaine Walter and Miss Judy McFall were consecrated in the same service.

The Rev. Wilfred Junke, pastor of Trinity Church, Mt. Clemens, Michigan and brother-in-law of Mr. Bellhorn preached the sermon. The rite of installation was performed by the Rev. H. R. Wacker, Chairman of the Board of Management. The Rev. Carl Nietzke, chairman of the Board of Education conducted the Consecration ceremony.

The Rev. E. Schildt and Rev. G. Hildner, members of the Board of Management were the liturgists. Mr. Louis Beer, Musical Director at the Lutheran Church of the Epiphany served as organist and Mrs. Beer, soloist, sang "How beautiful are the Feet," by Haendel.

A reception sponsored by the Ladies Auxiliary for the Deaf was held immediately after the service in the basement dining room of Bernthal Hall.

Mr. Bellhorn has served the School since 1930 and Mr. Holste joined the staff in 1957. Miss Walter and Miss McFall are newcomers having begun their teaching career in September. We pray for Senator Wallentime a safe return to her country and the Lord's richest blessings in her responsible position.




