Christmas and You

There is a very personal note in the Christmas message which is frequently missed by many. The birth of Jesus is not simply an interesting fact of history wholly unrelated to your present life . . . but rather it has a direct bearing upon it.

When the angel announced the birth of Jesus to the shepherds, the personal importance of His coming was emphasized. He said, "Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10, 11.)

Have you ever thought that it was for YOU the Savior was born? Do you realize that when God sent His Son into the world, He sent Him to become YOUR Saviour? Listen to the word of the herald angel, "I bring YOU good tidings of great joy . . . for unto YOU is born . . . a Saviour." Yes . . . it was for YOU that Jesus came.

To receive the gift of God by faith you must believe that Christ actually was born to be YOUR Saviour. You should trust Him because He died for your sins. You should trust Him because He lives, having risen from the dead.








The annual Hallowe'en party given by the teachers, affords opportunity for creativeness by the older groups of children. These winners indicate a wide variety of ingenuity and originality.

DEAF MISSIONS GROW

For the first time in the history of Deaf Missions the number of deaf communicant members of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod went above the 5,000 mark with a total of 5,022 members as of December 31, 1962. This is an increase of 73 members or 1.4% over the 1961 membership.

Our missionaries conducted 5,321 services during the year and

Our missionaries conducted 5,321 services during the year and a total of 173,277 Deaf attended these services. At the present time our Church is working with the Deaf in 44 states and 5 Canadian provinces. At the end of 1962 there were reported 40 congregations for the Deaf and preaching stations in 189 other cities.

The Deaf contributed a total of \$111,099 for home purposes,

The Deaf contributed a total of \$111,099 for home purposes, which was an increase of 1.4% over the \$109,616 contributed during 1961. For missions the Deaf contributed last year \$23,128, which is approximately a 5% increase over the \$22,046 contributed in 1961. The cost for the Deaf Mission program of Synod during 1962 was \$393, 334. To this must be added the \$111,099 the Deaf contributed for home purposes, bringing the total cost of the Deaf Mission during 1962 to \$504,433. This is the first time in the history of the mission where the total cost of the mission exceeded one-half million dollars. The Deaf contributed 22% of this total cost, with Synod being responsible for the other 78%. However, it must be remembered that besides paying 22% of the overall cost of the Deaf Mission the Deaf also contributed over \$23,000 for the general work of missions in Synod and District, which is the highest contribution from the Deaf for Synod and District in the history of the mission.

All missionaries to the Deaf, all members of the Deaf Mission, and all friends of the mission have much cause to rejoice over these statistics for 1962. God continues to work in the hearts and the lives of the Deaf. God be praised for His blessings and may He continue to pour out His Holy Spirit upon the Mission to the Deaf.
