
Parents who are present for the program may take their children home after the service. All other children will be sent home by plane, train or bus as directed.

gone into these plans and we feel this beautiful wing when completed will adequately fulfill the many needs for which it was designed.

# NEED FOR ADDITIONAL FACILITIES PROMPTS NEW BUILDING PROGRAM

It had long been the dream of the school to have an indoor area with a high ceiling for recreational activities. For many years the neighboring public school gym has been rented for one afternoon period a week during the winter months so that, at least, our older boys could derive additional benefit from a physical education program.

Over the past several years, classroom and bedroom facilities became inadequate as enrollment increased. A room in the girls dormitory was "borrowed" for classroom use, the rhythm room was converted into a classroom, the arts and craft room moved into the basement and the boys hospital room became a regular daily bedroom. The need of a better facility for serving meals to large groups was also felt.

Thus, the over crowded conditions within our present buildings, plus the great need for a large multi-purpose activities room motivated the Association in its Annual Meeting last June, to pass a resolution instructing the Board of Directors to proceed with plans and the erection of an addition which would fulfill present requirements, alleviate the crowded conditions and bring a dream into reality.

The new unit, when completed, will provide Physical Education space, restore present "borrowed" rooms to their original use and provide space for increased enrollment.

As mentioned in a previous issue of this paper, it will not be necessary at this time to embark upon a MAJOR fund raising campaign since some legacy funds have been set aside to pay for the erection of the unit. However, sufficient financial help, over and above the general operational costs will be needed to furnish and equip the various rooms.

And, so, we come to you at this time with a SPECIAL PLEA for your help in making it possible to complete the entire building program. Congregations, church related organizations, groups, families or individuals may want to place an offering in memory or in honor of a loved one or they may just want to send a gift check for bountiful blessings received.

Inscribed bronze plaques will be placed on the doors or walls designating the organization, family or individuals who choose to pay for the construction or furnishing and equiping of a room.

Costs are as follows:

Cost of Furnishings and Equipment

Children's Living room	1,200.00
Children's Bedroom (6 beds)	1,000.00

Gifts of smaller amounts will be designated for physical education equipment, children's library books and educational materials which will be appropriately recognized.

Inquiries, already, have been received concerning the placement of special memorials and it is our hope and fervant prayer that every room might be complete with a plaque on the door or wall indicating the group or individuals who were willing to share some of their earthly blessings with less fortunate children of God. Any gifts, large or small, will be deeply appreciated.






