The 92nd school year opened on Tuesday, September 8 with an enrollment of 116 pupils. Of these, twenty are new enrollees who hail from Michigan, Ohio, Virginia and Illinois.

Preceding the opening of school, the faculty held a two-day meeting and the household staff met for a day making final preparations and attending to innumerable details before the children's arrival

There is no rental charge. However, we hope that a contribution at the time of the showing or at some later date will be forthcoming.

ADDITIONAL FACILITIES PLANNED

Plans are now under way to add a new wing to our present buildings which will provide much needed classroom, bedroom and living room space, plus a large physical education room. The cost of such a multi purpose unit is estimated at \$200,000.00. God willing, the building should be ready for occupancy when school opens in September of 1965.

We give praise and thanks to Almighty God who through the years opened the hearts and hands of His children in support of this special missionary endeavor to an extent that it was possible from time to time to set aside legacy funds in preparation for the day of expansion. **That day has arrived.** And now we are happy to announce that since sufficient funds are available to finance the Project, it will not be necessary to embark on a major fund raising campaign — thanks to the continued support of our Christian friends.

However, the cost of the new building does not include furnishings and equipment. Also the school's operating budget has increased considerably over the years which means that only a boost in general income will make it possible to stay out of the "red."

The rooms in our present buildings which were erected in 1936 and 1940 were dedicated in memory or in honor of loved ones by churches, related organizations, families and individuals. In some instances the dedication gift covered the cost of building the room — in others it paid for the furnishings and equipment. Such gifts truly are a God pleasing expression of love for the Savior and the extension of His kingdom among the Deaf. It is our sincere hope that on the day of dedication of this new wing the door to each room will have an inscribed bronze plaque signifying that a certain individual or group, out of thankfulness to God for blessings received, chose to bring forth a special gift and place it in the Lutheran School for the Deaf.

GLEANINGS FROM THE REPORTS RENDERED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION FOR THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF.

Meetings Held

All necessary meetings of the full Board and Board appointed committees were held during the past year.

Enrollment

The 1963-64 School year (91st) opened with an enrollment of 117 pupils which was the highest in the history of the school. Twenty-one (21) of these are new enrollees; 4 Canada, 1 Florida, 3 Indiana, 1 Ohio, 9 Michigan, 3 Minnesota. To accept this number, a room in the girls' dormitory was converted to a classroom and one of the boys' hospital rooms is being used as a daily bedroom. Also, one staff bedroom was converted to a boy's living room. Confirmation — Baptism

A class of thirteen (13) pupils was confirmed on Palm Sunday by Pastor Borchardt. — It is on this day that children reach the goal for which their parents enrolled them and it is on this day, too, when parents of the Confirmands express special thanks to God who through the loyal benefactors of the school has most bountifully blessed them and their loved ones. Five pupils were baptized in March.

New Enrollment

To date, it seems that we will be able to accept seventeen (17) or eighteen (18) new pupils for next September.

The school's entire staff consists of forty-six (46) people of which sixteen (16) are teachers. In addition to these, many faithful volunteers gave the School much valuable service.

New Teachers Two new qualified teachers will join our faculty next September as replacements. Also the school will have three college students training under our scholarship program to become fully qualified to teach the deaf.

Since a great need for adequately trained teachers of the Deaf exists throughout our Country, and since our own school is still in need of several more licensed teachers we are continuing to make every effort in creating interest among young students to train in the area of deaf education. Whenever members of the school staff address groups, the need for more teachers is stressed. Now, with the United States Government offering one year scholarships, the national shortage of teachers of the Deaf ought to lessen considerably within the next several years considerably within the next several years.

It is most gratifying to know that our school enjoys a very enviable reputation in the field of special education. Wherever one comes in contact with persons acquainted and familiar with the education of the deaf, Lutherans are always being complimented on the fine School they operate. Reputation

Physical Education
The School's physical education and recreational program, among other things, also includes instruction in swimming and gymnastics at the Y.M.C.A. The Northeast and North Detroit Kiwanis Clubs again provided the necessary "Y" memberships for our public memberships for our pupils.

Treats

Treats
Our family of deaf children was afforded many enjoyable treats during the entire school year. These consisted of parties arranged for them here at the school as well as away from school, picnics and campouts, weekly free bowling, free tickets to football and baseball games and Ice Capades, etc., etc. These pleasures were provided by churches and other organizations as well as individual friends. Some of the organizations were Guardian, Epiphany, Good Shepherd, Immanuel Dearborn churches plus Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, Girls Clubs and Girl Scouts and especially also our own Ladies' Auxiliary.

Family Health and Care Due to the Lord's rich blessings and the excellent care of our house-mothers, the school's large family of deaf children enjoyed good health. Valuable free services were made available to the school by our staff of health professionals who, again, were willing and ready to serve our children

at all times. These were Physicians: Dr. Charles H. Sharrer and Dr. W. A. Huegli; Otologist, Dr. Floyd A. Seyfried; Dermatologist, Dr. Dwight Porter; Chiropodist, Dr. Lester C. Kreis and Dentists, Dr. Carlisle Rueger and Dr. Warren D. Bruland. In addition to these, free services were also given by a number of Optometrists, especially, Drs. Jerome and Owen Dueweke.

Property Maintenance

The school's property is being kept in fine condition. However, as the buildings become older, maintenance man-hours and costs rise in proportion. During the year, plus the usual daily work, our maintenance men painted fourteen classrooms, nine dormitory rooms, five utility and storage rooms and caulked and painted approximately one half of the more than 400 window and door frames in the building. The completion of the window job plus the painting of the two residences, the pavilion and additional dormitory rooms is planned for this Summer.

Elm disease finally has reached the school campus. No less than fifteen (15) trees had to be removed. Three (3) were too large for our caretakers to cope with so they were removed by a Tree Service firm.

New Installations and Replacements

The entire roof area of our buildings except for the kitchen was resurfaced.

b. A large gas heating unit was removed from the kitchen entrance way and installed on the roof where it operates much more efficiently.

c. Some work in the area of modernizing and redecorating was done in the two private residences and a room was added to the Director's home.

State Inspection State inspection is an annual procedure. The Department of Health found all school facilities in very good order. The inspector stated that it was a joy for him to tour this agency's neat and well-kept buildings.

Publicity

Publicity

The school's publicity work so necessary for the ingathering of the required operating funds again consisted of the one appeal letter per year to pastors and other individuals, four issues of the quarterly periodical "The Deaf Child's Advocate," its motion picture, "The World of Silence," memorial folders, other informational pamphlets, speakers and demonstrations with children for all manner of programs, and visiting days for groups. Visiting groups came from many far and near points. Demonstrations with pupils and speaking engagements also were very numerous.

The Deaf Child's Advocate

Our school's quarterly paper endeavors to keep the needs and the cause of the deaf children before its many readers. This important "life line" has a circulation of approximately 97,000 copies.

Punil Cost

Pupil Cost The approximate annual cost to educate, house, feed and care for a deaf child in our school is on a par with other schools of similar nature, namely, \$3,000.00 per child. Since the school can expect to receive only about 1/8 or \$53,500.00 of its annual total financial needs from parents in the form of fees, much publicity is required in soliciting the support of Christians here, there and everywhere for the balance of approximately \$300,000.00. Ladies Auxiliary

The financial assistance and volunteer services rendered the school by its wonderful and everwilling Ladies Auxiliaries during the past year were tremendous and varied.

Recommendation

Having reviewed the report of the Board of Education, together with a review of a Survey Committee regarding the up-grading of our present facilities, the Board of Management requests the approval of the members of the Association for the Lutheran School for the Deaf for the construction of a multi-purpose wing to our present facilities and authorize the Board of Management to act accordingly. (Ed. note — this resolution was unanimously adopted.)
