On Tuesday, September 7 the Lutheran School for the Deaf opened its doors for the 93rd year to welcome 117 pupils who hail from many areas of the United States and Canada. For 15 children it was a new experience and for the rest it meant continuation of their educational program. The "old" pupils were especially thrilled to see the progress which has been made on the New North Wing addition. When they left in June for their Summer vacation the building was hardly beyond the foundation stage. Now part of it has been roofed and some doors and windows are in place. Naturally, their big question was: "When do we move in?" Our answer: "God willing, we shall move in before Thanksgiving."

Another quick observation brought forth another question: "What happened to our big beautiful Elm tree in front of the school?" Answer: "It had to be cut down and hauled away because of the terrible Elm disease." Any noted changes brought question after question.

Naturally, these children are very much interested in the school and its day to day activities since to them it is a "home away from home" where living becomes ever more meaningful and learning of prime importance as they embark upon another school year.

CONGRESS ACTS TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL TRAINING FOR THE DEAF

Public Law 89-36 called "National Technical Institute for the Deaf Act" recently enacted is a beginning step toward preparing more deaf people for better paying jobs. At present, far too many deaf High School students or those beyond the age of 16 find that for them programs offering further Education are very limited or non-existant especially in the field of Technology.

The new act authorizes the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare to enter into an agreement with an institution of higher education for the establishment, construction, equipping and operation of a National Technical Institute for the Deaf for the purpose of providing a residential facility for post-secondary technical training and education for persons who are deaf in order to prepare them for successful employment.

In this age of automation, it seems that unless a person can produce a High School diploma or demonstrate required technical knowledge, his field of employment is narrowing day by day at a rapid rate of speed.

The new law is an attempt to rectify this situation.

GLEANINGS FROM THE ANNUAL REPORTS

Meetings Held

All necessary meetings of the full Board and Board appointed committees were held during the past year. The Board of Education also held periodic meetings with the administrators and staff members, and it also visited classes. It can report that the School had a very capable and efficient faculty as well as household staff and that the work in school and the home faculty as well as household staff and that the work in school and the home progressed very satisfactorily. **Enrollment**

The 92nd School Year opened on September 8th with an enrollment of 117 pupils. (Boys 65 — Girls, 52) Of these, 21 were new enrollees who hail from Michigan, Ohio, Virginia and Illinois.

Pupil Geographic Representation: 18 States and Canada (Michigan 52, Canada 17, Ohio 12, others 36).

Family Church Affiliation: Lutheran 62, Protestant 43, Catholic 7, Jewish unchurched 3.

New Enrollment for Sept. 1965

To date, it seems that we shall be able to accept 10 to 12 new pupils for the 1965-66 school term. The majority of these will be Lutheran children.

The school's total staff consists of 46 people of which 17 are teachers. In addition to these, many faithful volunteers gave the school much valuable service.

New Teachers

Due to marriages, family increases and State Certification regulations which affect some of our present faculty members, we shall have eight (8) new teachers next Fall. Of these, three (3) trained with the aid of the school's scholarship fund.

Fortunately, we had no great difficulty in filling the positions required for the 1965-66 school year.

Teacher Recruitment

At present the school has two (2) students in training under its scholar-ship program. By September 1st., two (2) more will be added to the list.

Due to the Lord's rich blessings and the excellent care of our housemothers, the school's large family of deaf children enjoyed good health. Valuable free services were made available to the school by our staff of health professionals who, again were willing and ready to serve our children at all times. These were Physicians, Dr. Charles H. Sharrer and Dr. W. A. Huegli; Otologist, Dr. Floyd A. Seyfried; Dermatologist, Dr. A. Ulbrich; Chiropodist, Dr. Lester C. Kreis and Dentists, Dr. Carlisle Rueger and Dr. Warren D. Bruland. In addition to these, free services were also given by a number of Optometrists, especially Drs. Jerome and Owen Dueweke. Physical Education

The school's physical education and recreational program among other things, also includes instruction in swimming and gymnastics at the Y.M.C.A. The Northeast and North Detroit Kiwanis Clubs again provided the necessary "Y" memberships for our pupils.

The children were afforded many enjoyable treats during the entire school year. These consisted of parties arranged for them here at the school school year. These consisted of parties arranged for them here at the school as well as away from school, picnics and campouts, weekly free bowling, free tickets to football and baseball games, etc., etc. These pleasures were provided by church and other organizations as well as individual friends. Some of these were Epiphany, Good Shepherd, Immanuel, Dearborn churches plus Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, Girls Clubs and Girl Scouts and especially also our own Ladies' Auxiliary.

Property Maintenance

The school's property is being kept in fine condition. However, we can expect that as the buildings become older, maintenance time and cost will increase proportionately. The usual Summer painting was started early this Spring so that our buildings might look as clean, fresh and neat as possible when expected Synodical delegates and visitors tour our Campus during the coming Convention. The Ephphatha Conference numbering from 60 to 80

Elm disease continues to take its toll. Since our last meeting (7) more large elm trees had to be removed making a total of twenty two (22) over the past two years. Plans are under way to plant trees of different varieties

Major Replacements and Installations

a. New flues were installed in the 1938 Johnson Boiler.

The 450 gallon Hot Water Storage Tank was replaced with a 650 gallon tank.

The Hot Water Heater in the boy's dormitory had to be replaced. The school has been instructed by the City Fire Department to install sprinklers in several areas of the present buildings. This will be done in the near future.

Inspection

The State Department of Health made its annual inspection of all school facilities and found them in very good order. The Detroit City Department of Health inspects several times a year. These Departments always commend the school on its neat and well-kept buildings and appointments.

Pupil Cost

The Annual cost to educate, house and feed a deaf child in our school still stands at approximately \$3000.00 which is on a par with other schools of a similar nature. Since the school can expect to receive on the average only about ½ of its annual total financial needs from parents in the form of tuition fees, the balance must be received through freewill offerings Publicity

The school's publicity work so necessary for the ingathering of the required operating funds again consisted of the **one appeal** letter per year to readers of our School Paper which includes the pastors; four issues of the quarterly periodical "The Deaf Child's Advocate;" the new motion picture "A New Life for Jennifer;" Memorial folders; Informational pamphlets; speakers and demonstrations with children for various types of programs; and visiting days for groups. Publicity activities are continually going on during the year. during the year.

The Deaf Child's Advocate

Our School's quarterly paper endeavors to tell the story of educating deaf children for this life and for heaven and to keep the needs of the school before its many readers. The paper which has a circulation of approximately 96,000 copies is considered the important "life line" in our publicity department.

The New Film

The movie "A New Life for Jennifer" which has been in circulation since September has enjoyed an exceptionally fine reception in our congregations, related organizations, parent groups, service clubs and educational institutions throughout the U.S. and Canada. One copy is on its way to Australia and Hong Kong, and a request from Africa also has been received. Twenty-four copies are in circulation at the present time.

Our motion picture won the "Blue Ribbon" award at the American Film Festival held recently in New York City.

Construction of the new addition is well underway. The building plans call for seven (7) classrooms, a children's and teacher's Library, a lounge, two children's bedrooms and living rooms, three staff rooms, a large multipurpose room (Gym) and a Ladies' Auxiliary Kitchen. God willing, the building should be ready for occupancy by late Fall.


THE NEW WING — FROM THE BOTTOM UP
