#### SCHOOL OPENING

On Tuesday, September 6 the School began its 94th year of educating deaf children - preparing them for this life and for heaven.

Fourteen (14) new pupils were accepted this Fall bringing the total enrollment to one hundred twenty-three (123) children ranging in age from three and a half (3½) to fifteen (15) which constitutes the largest enrollment in the history of the school. Every classroom and bedroom space has been filled and still we have a waiting list of applicants.

In order to take care of the increased enrollment, an additional

teacher and housemother had to be employed.

Previous to the day of school opening Principal Herman Holste and the Faculty held a four day workship in preparation for the

busy days ahead.

#### **BOARD MEMBER RETIRES**

Upon completion of 35 years of outstanding service Fred J. Auch of the George W. Auch Construction Company, Detroit retired as a member of the School's Board of Directors. All those who served with him during these many years recognized his keen interest in the School's total program and his wise counsel in its operation.

During 1941-42 he held the position of President of the Association (67 congregations) which owns and operates the Lutheran School for the Deaf. During this time he also served as Chairman of the Board.

In the 1930's when the original three story brick building was condemned as a firetrap by the City of Detroit and new construction was dictated, Mr. Auch, himself a builder, was an active member of the building committee. Through five major building projects on the campus during the next thirty years his knowledge and experience were invaluable to the School.

In appreciation of his many years of faithful service to the School, the Board of Directors presented Mr. Auch with a plaque

at a special dinner given in his honor.

We certainly shall miss his presence at the Board meetings and can only say: "Thank you, Fred, for serving the Lord these many years in His kingdom among the Deaf and may God richly bless you for it."

# ANNUAL MEETING OF THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF ASSOCIATION

#### Gleanings From the Reports

ANNUAL FESTIVAL — The 93rd school year of the Lutheran School for the Deaf closed on Sunday, June 12 with the Annual School Closing Festival at which occasion The Rev. Edwin C. Weber, President of the Michigan District preached the sermon.

ENROLLMENT — The 93rd School Year opened on September 7th with an enrollment of 115 pupils. (Boys 62 — Girls, 53). Of these 15 were new enrollees who hail from Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana.

Pupil Geographic Representation: 18 States and Canada (Michigan 53, Canada 15, Ohio 13, others 34).

Family Church Affiliation: Lutheran 66, Protestant 37, Catholic 7, Jewish 2, unchurched 3.

CONFIRMATION — 8th GRADE — This Fall the school will reactivate the 8th grade which was dropped some years ago. The 7th graders will return for another year of education and be confirmed next Spring. Because of this change, only one boy from California was confirmed by Rev. N. E. Borchardt Monday, June 13th in our chapel service.

NEW ENROLLMENT FOR SEPT. 1966 — To date, it seems that we shall be able to accept 10 to 12 new pupils for the 1966-67 school term. The majority of these will be Lutheran children.

STAFF — The school's total staff consists of 48 people of which 18 are teachers. In addition to these many faithful volunteers gave the school much valuable service.

NEW TEACHERS — All teacher contracts have been signed for the 1966-67 school year. Three teachers will be leaving us and these will be replaced by three new graduates. Fortunately, we had no great difficulty in filling the positions required for the 1966-67 school year.

TEACHER RECRUITMENT — At present the school has two (2) students in training under its scholarship program. By September 1st., one or two more will be added to the list.

FAMILY HEALTH AND CARE — Due to the Lord's rich blessings and the excellent care of our housemothers, the school's large family of deaf children enjoyed good health. Generally we expect an epidemic or two of measles or one of the other, so-called, childhood diseases during the school year but very few of such cases were experienced this term.

INSPECTION — The State Department of Health made its annual inspection of all school facilities and found them in very good order. The Detroit City Department of Health inspects several times a year. These Departments always commend the school on its neat and well-kept buildings and appointments.

PUPIL COST — The Annual cost to educate, house and feed a deaf child in our school still stands at approximately \$3000.00 which is on a par with other schools of a similar nature. The school can expect to receive on the average only about 1/8 of its annual total financial needs from parents in the form of tuition fees.

PUBLICITY — The school's publicity work so necessary for the ingathering of the required operating funds again consisted of one appeal letter per year to the readers of our School Paper which includes the pastors; four issues of the quarterly periodical "The Deaf Child's Advocate"; the motion picture "A New Life for Jennifer"; Memorial folders; Informational pamphlets; speakers and demonstrations with children for various types of programs; and visiting days for groups. Publicity activities are continually going on during the year.

THE DEAF CHILD'S ADVOCATE — Our School's quarterly paper endeavors to tell the story of educating deaf children for this life and for heaven and to keep the needs of the school before its many readers. The paper which has a circulation of approximately 90,000 copies is considered the important "life line" in our publicity department.

THE FILM — The movie "A New Life for Jennifer" which has been in circulation since September 1965 has enjoyed an exceptionally fine reception in our congregations, related organizations, parent groups, service clubs and educational institutions throughout the U.S. and Canada. One copy was used in Australia and Hong Kong. Twenty-four copies are in circulation at the present time. To date the film has won five National Awards at the Film Festivals.

LADIES AUXILIARY — The financial assistance and volunteer services rendered the school by its wonderful and everwilling Ladies' Auxiliaries during the past year were tremendous and varied.

We should never under-evaluate the tremendous power for good which these two organizations represent in the overall operational picture of making this school a real "Home away from home" for the children in our care.

JOHN A. KLEIN WING — The new wing was dedicated on Sunday, January 30. Dr. Oliver R. Harms was the preacher for this special occasion. The Ladies' Auxiliary for the Deaf served light refreshments after the Service. The building is meeting those needs for which it was designated and if the children could eat, sleep and live in the new gym they would be an especially happy group.

Except for a few minor items the building is completed and paid for. A total of 47 organizations, families and individuals paid for the furnishings and equipment.

### FILM AVAILABLE

The film, "A New Life For Jennifer" is available for scheduling. We sincerely hope that every congregation and/or related organization will include a showing of this outstanding 27 minute, all color-sound production in their 1966-67 schedule of meetings, educational programs and social events. There is no rental charge. However, we hope that a contribution at the time of the showing or at some later date will be forthcoming.


