PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION FOR THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

In this 94th year of our God-given School for the Deaf we would remember Christ's command: "Go . . . disciple the nations . . . TEACH".

Permit me, therefore, to quote the following from Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book, "The Cost of discipleship."

"Only he who believes is obedient, only he who is obedient believes.

For faith is only real when there is obedience, never without it, and faith only becomes faith in the act of obedience.

For by grace ye have been saved . . . For we are His workman-ship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God afore

prepared that we should walk in them. Eph. 2, 8-10. Ultimately there is only one good work; the work of God in Christ Jesus. Thru God's own action in Christ we have been saved and not thru our own works. We can never boast about them for we are ourselves His workmanship. Yet it remains true that the whole purpose of our new creation in Christ is that in Him we

might attain unto good works.

But all our good works are the works of God Himself, the works for which He has prepared us beforehand. Good works then are ordained for the sake of salvation, but they are in the end those which God Himself works within us. They are His gift, but it is OUR task to walk in them at every moment of our lives, knowing all the time that any good works of our own could never help us to abide before the judgment seat of God. We cling in faith to Christ and His works alone. For we have the promise that those who are in Christ Jesus will be enabled to do good works, which will testify for them in the day of judgment. They will be preserved and sanctified until the last day. All we can do is to believe in God's Word, rely on His promise, and walk in the good works which He prepared for us."


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On Tuesday, September 5, the Lutheran School for the Deaf, first and oldest Charity serving the Church Synodwide, began its 95th year of educating deaf children — preparing them for this life and for heaven.

Twelve new pupils were accepted this Fall bringing the total to 117. There is the possibility of one or two more being accepted in September.

Previous to the day of school opening, Principal Herman Holste and the Faculty held a two day workshop. Besides the new teachers, the children were greeted by two new housemothers — one in the boys and one in the girls dormitory.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF ASSOCIATION

Gleanings from the Reports

ANNUAL FESTIVAL — The 94th school year of our beloved Lutheran School for the Deaf closed on Sunday, June 11 with the Annual Festival. The Rev. Dr. John F. Choitz was the main speaker. Instead of a separate Children's Program at 2 P.M. and Festival Service at 3 P.M. as had been the custom, we combined the two this year and began the program at 2:15 P.M. In connection with the program there was a ceremony of presenting awards of merit to pupils for outstanding performances.

ENROLLMENT — Fourteen new pupils were enrolled last Fall. These hailed from Canada, Florida, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi and Virginia which makes a total of 122 children. (68 boys — 54 girls)

CONFIRMATION — On Palm Sunday 8 children were confirmed by the Rev. N. E. Borchardt in our School Chapel. It is on this happy occasion that parents express their deep gratitude to the school and its loyal friends and supporters for having provided a Christian Education for their deaf children.

NEW ENROLLMENT FOR SEPT. 1967 — To date, it seems that we shall be able to accept 10 to 12 new pupils for the 1967-68 school term. The majority of these will be Lutheran children.

STAFF — The school's total staff consists of 51 people of which 19 are teachers. In addition to these, many faithful volunteers gave the school much valuable service.

TEACHER RECRUITMENT — At present the school has four (4) students in training under its scholarship program. By September 1st., one or two more will be added to the list. Two of these students who are training at Eastern Michigan University will be doing their practice teaching in our school next year.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM AND EQUIPMENT — The school continues to investigate the means whereby each deaf child may progress faster and more thoroughly. Faculty committees spend hours in examining and evaluating new text books, library books and teaching materials.

Our Federal Government is spending enormous sums of money in research projects, teacher scholarships and in making teaching aids available to schools for the Deaf. To date, our school has received 4 Overhead projectors, 8 Screens, 8 Projection tables, film strips and transparencies — with more to come. All of this equipment is on permanent loan.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES — The school has a very active Sewing Club, A Charm Club and a Busy Bee Club which are directed and supervised by volunteer teachers. Weekly Bowling is another activity supervised by the teachers.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION — Our children now have had a full year to profit from the use of our new John A. Klein Wing and Gymnasium. The Gym has proved to be a spark plug for athletic events of all kinds and has provided the facilities for increased participation in local indoor track competition.

Our track team won the 1st place trophy for smaller schools at the Lutheran High East track and field meet this Spring.

Our boys also participated in touch football, basketball and softball games with parochial school teams.

Instruction in swimming and gymnastics at the Y.M.C.A. for our older children continues as a part of the Physical Education program. The Northeast and North Detroit Kiwanis Clubs again provided the necessary "Y" memberships.

TREATS — Our family of deaf children was afforded many enjoyable treats during the entire school year. These consisted of parties arranged for them here at the school as well as away from school, picnics and campouts, weekly free bowling, free tickets for football and baseball games, etc., etc. These

TEACHERS WORKSHOP HELD

The entire teaching staff returned early to participate in a general work-shop on August 31 and September 1 at the school. This enabled the teachers to review the course of study and language outlines for the various levels. New Text Books, Visual Aids, Audio Equipment and Policy changes were discussed. It also, gave the teachers an opportunity to thoroughly prepare their classrooms for school opening.

The new teachers met with Principal Holste two days previous to the time of the work-shop for a general briefing and curriculum study.

pleasures were provided by church and other organizations as well as individual friends.

FAMILY HEALTH AND CARE — Due to the Lord's rich blessings and the excellent care of our housemothers, the school's large family of deaf children enjoyed good health. Generally we expect an epidemic or two of measles or one of the other so-called childhood diseases during the school year but, except for several cases of mumps, very few of such cases were experienced this term.

Professional people who volunteer their services in order that our family might have the best possible health care are the following:

The school is signally blessed in that it has these professional friends who serve on our "health team" without ever asking for remuneration.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE — The School's property is being kept in fine condition. We can expect maintenance time and cost to increase as the buildings get older. The usual painting and decorating in various areas of the buildings will begin immediately after the school closes. The heating system of the old buildings will be thoroughly checked this summer by a heating firm and repairs made where necessary.

During the year approximately 20 diseased Elm trees were removed.

INSPECTION — The State Department of Health made its annual inspection of all school facilities and found them in very good order. The Detroit City Department of Health inspects several times a year. These Departments always commend the school on its neat and well-kept buildings and appointments.

Since we are on the Government School Lunch Program, the Department of Agriculture also inspects our Government Lunch account, Government food supplies on hand and menus. This inspection was made last week with the inspectors comment that the program is being excellently administered.

PUPIL COST — The Annual cost to educate, house and feed a deaf child in our school still stands at approximately \$3000.00 which is on a par with other schools of a similar nature. Since the school can expect to receive on the average only about 1/8 of its annual total financial needs from parents in the form of tuition fees, much publicity is required.

PUBLICITY — The school's publicity work so necessary for the ingathering of the required operating funds again consisted of the one appeal letter per year to the readers of our School Paper which includes the pastors; four issues of the quarterly periodical "The Deaf Child's Advocate"; the motion picture "A New Life for Jennifer"; Memorial folders; Informational pamphlets; Speakers and demonstrations with children for various types of programs; and visiting days for groups. Publicity activities are continually going on during the year. A total of 89 activities such as talks and demonstrations and the entertaining of visiting groups were a part of the school's 1966-67 program in bringing the deaf child and his needs to the attention of ever greater numbers of people.

THE DEAF CHILD'S ADVOCATE — Our School's quarterly paper endeavors to tell the story of educating deaf children for this life and for heaven and to keep the needs of the school before its many readers. The paper which has a circulation of approximately 90,000 copies is considered the important "life line" in our publicity department.

THE FILM — The movie "A New Life for Jennifer" which has been in circulation since September 1965 has enjoyed an exceptionally fine reception in our congregations, related organizations, parent groups, service clubs and educational institutions throughout the U.S. and Canada. Twenty-eight copies are in circulation at the present time. To date the film has won five National Awards at Film Festivals and an International Blue Ribbon award at the World Festival held recently in Tehran.

LADIES' AUXILIARIES — The financial assistance and volunteer services rendered the school by its wonderful and everwilling Ladies' Auxiliaries during the past year were tremendous and varied. Each Chapter will render an activities report at this meeting.

We should never under-evaluate the tremendous power for good which these two organizations represent in the overall operational picture of making this school a real "Home away from home" for the children in our care.

DONATIONS IN KIND — "Pound Day" donations of groceries from our Metropolitan congregations and some farm produce from the Thumb Area churches, plus Sanders baked goods again have greatly assisted us in providing our pupils with good diversified and wholesome food. The Alpena Circuit again provided the school with its yearly supply of potatoes. (153-100 pound bags) Mr. Schmaltz of Galien, Michigan donated 75 bushels of apples.
