CHRISTMAS AND YOU

There is a very personal note in the Christmas message which is frequently missed by many. The birth of Jesus is not simply an interesting fact of history wholly unrelated to your present life . . . but rather it has a direct bearing upon it.

When the angel announced the birth of Jesus to the shepherds, the personal importance of His coming was emphasized. He said, "Fear not: for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10, 11.)

Dear Mr. Bellhorn: Would it be possible for you to give me some information con-Dear Mr. Bellhorn: Would it be possible for you to give me some information concerning the School for the Deaf. My grandfather, George Speckhard, was its first director or superintendent. I do not know what his title was at that time. Mrs. Dorothy Peters, who lives in Mentor-On-The-Lake, a suburb of Cleveland, and who is a great granddaughter of George Speckhard, has asked me to assist her in getting all the information possible concerning the history of this institution. She will be graduating from Lake Erie College in about a year and has chosen as her thesis the founding and history of this Lutheran Institution for the Deaf. Mrs. Peter's paternal grandfather was the Rev. Herman Speckhard of Saginaw, Michigan. My mother, Mrs. Emma Partenfelder, was the eldest daughter of George Speckhard. I am the only living child of my mother, and, I believe, the only one who knows anything about the school as my mother frequently told me of the early years of the institution. I am giving Mrs. Peter all the information I have as told to me. Inasmuch as you have this information and much more information which I do Inasmuch as you have this information and much more information which I do not have, I thought perhaps you could assist Mrs. Peters by giving her the history of the school from the beginning to date, which you must have in your archives. Some years ago, I believe it was in 1931, when the institution built the new school, they wrote my mother asking her to tell them what she knows about the beginning of the school, to which she responded and which is a part of the record. About ten or twelve years ago I visited the school. I believe a Mr. Klein was its director at that time. Needless to say, I am very proud of this fine institution. If it is at all possible to give me the history of the school, it would be very much appreciated.

OUR "HEALTH" TEAM

The school is deeply indebted to the professional people who volunteer their services gratuitously in order that our large family of deaf children might have the best possible health care. Since September our dentists Drs. Carlisle Rueger and Warren Bruland have examined and in some cases x-rayed the teeth of our children and now are busy every Thursday attending to their dental needs.

The Annual Eye examination Clinic was held at the school

Dr. Owen Dueweke spends some time each Tuesday morning on our campus checking eye glasses and any reports on sight diffi-culties. The eyes of the deaf child are all important to him in his quest for an education.

GLEANINGS FROM THE REPORTS RENDERED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION OF THE LUTHERAN SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

CHANGE OF DATE — Due to the change of date of the annual meeting from June to October, the general report covers a period of approximately 15

ENROLLMENT FOR 1968-69 SCHOOL YEAR—The 96th school year opened with 106 pupils enrolled, 54 boys and 52 girls. This enrollment is 10 less than last year and represents two fewer classes. From last year's classes two classes were graduated and two discontinued by placing the students out into other schools. The new enrollment consists of 20 pupils, 13 beginning (2 classes) and seven children placed into existing classes. Geographic Districtions classes. (2 classes) and seven children placed into existing classes. Geographic Distribution: Canada 15, Florida 2, Illinois 4, Indiana 7, Iowa 2, Louisian 1, Michigan 54, Minnesota 7, New Jersey 1, North Dakota 2, Ohio 8, Oregon 1, Virginia 2.

CONFIRMATION - BAPTISM - On Palm Sunday 12 children were received into communicant membership of our church by the rite of Confirmation. A confirmation dinner was held at the school, following the church service, at which the parents eagerly expressed their thanks to the school for having provided the fine Christian education over the years. It was on this memorable day that the children made public oral confession of their belief in their

Savior.
Six children were baptized in the Sunday morning worship service on May 19, 1968.

STAFF—The School's entire staff consists of 49 people. In addition to these, many faithful volunteers gave much valuable service. The teaching staff was readily completed for the new school year, 17 teachers. Only 2 two new teachers and one former teacher were contracted. Both new teachers completed their student teaching at our school during the second semester of the previous school year. of the previous school year.

TEACHER TRAINING - During the 1967-68 school term, the school entered into closer working relationship of a teacher training program with Eastern Michigan University at Ypsilanti. In the second semester three students participated in the student teaching program at our school. Currently there are two students receiving teaching experience with us. They are under the direct supervision of our staff. It is expected that the cooperative program will continue.

FAMILY HEALTH AND CARE — Due to the Lord's rich blessings and the excellent care of our housemothers, the school's large family of deaf children enjoyed good health. Generally we expect an epidemic or two of measles or one of the other so-called childhood diseases during the school year but, except for several cases of mumps, very few of such cases were experienced this term.

Professional people who volunteer their services in order that our family might have the best possible health care are the following:

ASLEEP IN JESUS — Twelve-year-old Rosali Cheifetz, daughter of Jewish parents, who was enrolled in our school at the age of four, fell asleep in Jesus on June 6th following a brain operation.

Mrs. J. A. Klein fell asleep in Jesus on August 5th. Funeral services were held in Texas and Christ Church, Detroit. Burial took place in Forest Lawn Cemetery.

DOCTORATE — Our Principal, Herman M. Holste, received his Ph.D. degree from Wayne State University, Detroit, last Spring.

RETIREMENT — Housemother Vera Handschin and teacher Agnes Hance retired last June and now are receiving benefits from the School's Special Retirement Fund.

HOUSEHOLD HELP — It is becoming increasingly difficult to find competent domestic help, especially in the Housemother category. Any referrals by pastors and lay delegates will be deeply appreciated.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE — The school's property is being kept in fine condition. We can expect maintenance time and cost to increase as the buildings grow older.

Last year we reported that 20 diseased elm trees were removed from the property. To this number we now must add nine more.

INSPECTION — The State Department of Health made its annual inspection of all school facilities and found them in good order. The Detroit City Department of Health inspects several times a year. These Departments always

commend the school on its neat and well-kept buildings and appointments.

Since we are on the Government School Lunch Program, the Department of Agriculture also inspects our Government Lunch account, Government food supplies on hand and the menus. The inspector was well satisfied with the administration of this program.

PUPIL COST — The annual cost to educate, house and feed a deaf child in our school now stands at approximately \$3600.00 which is on a par with other schools of a similar nature. Since the school can expect to receive on the average only about 1/8 of its annual total financial needs from parents in the form of tuition fees, much publicity for financial support is required.

PUBLICITY — The school's publicity work so necessary for the ingathering of the required operating funds again consisted of one appeal letter per year to the readers of our School Paper which includes the pastors; four issues of the quarterly periodical "The Deaf Child's Advocate"; the motion picture "A New Life for Jennifer"; Memorial folders; Informational pamphlets; Speakers and demonstrations with children for various types of programs; and visiting day for groups. Publicity activities are continually going on during the year. A total of 93 activities such as talks and demonstrations and the entertaining of visiting groups were a part of the school's 1967-68 program in bringing the deaf child and his needs to the attention of ever greater numbers of people.

THE DEAF CHILD'S ADVOCATE — Our School's quarterly paper endeavors to tell the story of educating deaf children for this life and for heaven and to keep the needs of the school before its many readers. The paper which has a circulation of approximately 90,000 copies is considered the important "life line" in our publicity department.

THE FILM — The movie "A New Life for Jennifer" which has been in circulation since September 1964 has enjoyed an exceptionally fine reception in our congregations, related organizations, parent groups, service clubs and educational institutions throughout the U.S. and Canada. Twenty-eight copies

are in circulation at the present time.

Through a contract with Modern Talking Pictures, Chicago, the school's film in the future will be available for showing on TV programs throughout the U.S.

LADIES' AUXILIARIES — The financial assistance and volunteer services rendered the school by its wonderful and everwilling Ladies' Auxiliaries during the past year were tremendous and varied. Each Chapter President will render an activities report at this meeting.

We should never under-evaluate the tremendous power for good which these two organizations represent in the overall operational picture of making this school a real "Home away from home" for the children in our care.
