## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RETIRES**

Walter Bellhorn, after 43 years of efficient and faithful service as teacher, principal and executive director of the Lutheran School for the Deaf, announced his retirement to the school's Board of Directors effective December 31, 1973. Mr. Bellhorn is a graduate of Concordia College, River Forest, Illinois and Wayne State University, Detroit. He took special training in Pittsburgh, Penn. and Wayne State to become a teacher of the deaf. He recalled that when he and his wife, Alma, arrived on the 20 acre campus the original farm house and barn were still in use. The old three story red brick school building would serve as school and home for the students for nine more years before it would be replaced by the present complex of buildings.

He notes that during these same years, hundreds of deaf children became students of the school so that they might receive a Christian education which would prepare them for this life and for heaven.

He stated that this was the joy and privilege of his calling, to bring the "good news" of salvation to deaf children.

### 101st SCHOOL YEAR IN PROGRESS

On Tuesday, September 4th, the school began its 101st year of education and training deaf children — thus preparing them for this life and for heaven. For several days before the opening of school, combined and separate meetings of the faculty and household staff were held in preparation for the busy year ahead.

#### **CENTENNIAL PROJECTS**

The following centennial projects have been completed or are in progress now:

- a. The Kresge garage and storage building was completed during the year.
- b. A new gas dryer was purchased for the laundry.
- c. A new Dodge Van Wagon (12 passenger) was purchased by the Detroit Ladies Auxiliary for the Deaf.
- d. Auditory testing equipment was purchased.
- e. Carpeting for rooms will soon be installed.
- f. New kitchen refrigerator was purchased.
- g. Metal storage shelving is being installed in the storage and media rooms.
- h. Outdoor flood lighting completed.
- i. Diesel generator and emergency lighting completed.
- j. Drywall treatment in 6 rooms.
- k. Heating system checked and repairs made where necessary.
- 1. Dining room redecorated.
- m. Caulking and glazing of windows.
- n. Lintels repaired.
- o. Outside wall cracks repaired.
- p. Resetting stone trim.
- q. Tree trimming and removal.

#### **OUR LADIES REPORT**

Greetings! It is just a year ago since our last writing. I am deeply grateful and also highly honored to again have the privilege of representing the "richest at heart" group, The Lutheran Ladies Auxiliary for the Deaf.

It has been a very busy year so far and no doubt will be the same until June.

At our last December meeting the Ladies undertook the project of purchasing a Dodge "Carry All" as a Centennial gift in the amount of four thousand dollars and seven cents. After making several payments of one thousand dollars each, the Ladies voted in October to pay off the remainder. At the Annual Meeting of the Association, held October 10th, our Ladies presented the final check to Vice-President, Reverend John Gagern. While this meeting was going on, our Ladies were preparing a delicious meal for the assembly. One thousand dollars also was donated to the School to start the Centennial Drive, making our Centennial contribution five thousand and four dollars.

As always, our Ladies worked very hard at the Festival serving dinners. Because of the Centennial Celebration it was an especially busy day. They ended up very tired after serving over nine-hundred people but very happy knowing they played a very important role in the success of the Festival. To everyone else who donated their services to help us, we extend our deepest gratitude.

Since the Schools' beginning, the Ladies have mended the children's clothing each week of the school year. This Fall a change was made to mend twice a month due to so many children spending weekends at home.

All of the proceeds from our parties, memorials, dime folders, etc. are allocated to the Student Fund. This is a project which we have had for many years. Each year we pay the full tuition for one student which amounts to about \$5,000.00.

Our next big event which we always look forward to is our "Christmas Tea". It is held following the Children's Christmas Program for the parents and friends on December 20th. The children have their punch and cookies with us. This year we are stressing our Christmas Booth of home made gifts. Donations to this project are always welcome and appreciated.

Our meetings are held ten months of the year. The September, December, January and April meetings are held at the School. April is our anniversary month which we always celebrate with a church service in the Chapel conducted by our Pastoral Counselor. Our present Counselor is Pastor D. E. Hasse, Redemption Lutheran Church, Detroit.

The other monthly meetings are held at various churches by invitation from the Ladies Societies. They serve us a delightful meal after which the proceeds of the luncheon are donated to our treasury as a gift. A gift of a Bible and Prayer Book is always a must for each member of the Confirmation Class

In regards to our Fair on April 30, 1974, any hand work of any kind or donations to help make our Fair a huge success will be appreciated. To all who have given of themselves in their own way, also to Ladies Societies, we express our humble thanks.

1962 - (June) Mr. Bellhorn became Executive Director, Mr. Holste, Principal.

1964 - (Sept.) New Film "A New Life for Jennifer" completed. Cost \$30,000.00.

1966 - (March) Klein Wing dedicated - Dr. Harms preached. Cost, \$391,000.00.

1968 - Annual Meeting date changed from June to October.

1968 - (Nov.) Rev. Biesenthal elected President of the Association and Chairman of the Board.
