### REV. RODNEY R. RYNEARSON ACCEPTS CALL AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



With thanks to God, we joyously announce that the Rev. Rodney R. Rynearson has become the new Executive Director of our School. Pastor Rynearson comes from Rochester, New York, where he was serving as Pastor of Alpha (Deaf) Congregation and Chaplain of the National Technical Institute of the Deaf.

Pastor Rynearson is married to the former Rhoda Ryan of Kansas City, Missouri, who has served as Lutheran Elementary Teacher for 11 years. They have 3 sons: Timothy, 14, Stephen, 13, and Peter, 10.

Pastor Rynearson grew up in Nebraska, and received his seminary training from Concordia, St. Louis. He served the Deaf first in the Northwest, living in Spokane, Washington and serving Idaho and Montana. While there, he was the chaplain and director of religious programs at the Idaho and Montana State School for the Deaf. He also served as Regional Advisor for the Pacific Region.

Since 1967, he has been serving the Lord in Rochester, New York. While there, he received his Master of Education degree from the University of Rochester, majoring in Philosophy of deaf education. He also served as chaplain of the two deaf schools in Rochester and Rome, as well as chaplain for the mentally retarded deaf at the Rome State School. He is the current Chairman of Ephphatha Conference and the Pastoral Advisor for the International Lutheran Deaf Association.

As he begins his new duties, we pray that God will pour out on all of us renewed zeal and love as we seek to provide the highest quality Christian education for each of those young people God has entrusted to our care. May all that we do help each growing child better know, love, and serve our glorious Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.



The giraffes sauntered forth Making the rabbits and kang And with a great big grin to Came Mr. Tortoise with is w


Then came creeping, crawling Wearing only great big smile Noah thought for peace of n T'was better to tie them on

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#### IN MEMORY OF DR. CHARLES H. SHARRER

Our beloved Dr. Charles H. Sharrer departed this life on April 24, 1974. He died at Evangelical Deaconess Hospital in Detroit where he had been a member of the staff for nearly 50 years.

Dr. Sharrer graduated from Detroit College of Medicine, now Wayne State University.

He provided medical services gratuitous for all our children here at the school for nearly 40 years and loved the work of caring for these hearing-impaired children.

He was named Father of the Year in 1959, having been nominated by the Lutheran School for the Deaf.

He was a member of the Economic Club of Detroit, Senior Mens Club of Grosse Pointe, Detroit Yacht Club Pelicans and sang with the Grosse Pointe Lakeshore Chorus.

In 1973, he retired completely from his regular practice but still continued to be available whenever required to administer to our children here at the school.

The Board of Directors, School Staff and the Children will greatly miss this truly dedicated servant of the Lord.

John Neufeld and Angie Mastronardi, two of our nine year old pupils in Miss Forsberg's class this past year, will not return to the Lutheran School for the Deaf next fall. Since their speech and language have progressed to the point where they are able to attend school with hearing children, they have been enrolled in schools in their ownneighborhood.

John of Leamington, Ontario, began attending school here just before his 4th birthday. He had already had some tutoring and auditory training at the Rehabilitation Institute in Detroit.

Angie, also from Leamington, began her schooling too at the Rehabilitation Institute and became one of John's classmates when he began his second year here.

Both children continued to make good progress, especially in using their residual hearing for learning language.

After 5 years at Lutheran School for the Deaf, they are now ready to join their friends at local schools. This is a goal toward which we work with all our pupils—integration into hearing schools. We pray for God's blessings on John and Angie both now and in their future lives.
