AN ALUMNA REPORT

We are always pleased to hear how our alumnae are doing. Recently Barbara Brauer Sachs spent a weekend with us helping us focus our thoughts and goals. Barbara was born deaf and has a 100 decibel hearing loss. She attended the Lutheran School for eight years. Since she left here, she has attended regular schools. This fall she will receive her Ph.D. from New York University in Clinical Psychology.



Mrs. Sachs is now a Psychologist at the Federal Mental Hospital, St. Elizabeths, in Washington, D.C. She led us in a discussion regarding mental health and the feelings of the deaf. She stated that recent books and research studies point out that the majority of deaf people have pronounced feelings of inferiority and low levels of self-esteem and self-worth. These studies also show that deaf people also perceive the attitude of hearing people toward deafness and deaf persons to be decidedly negative.

Mrs. Sachs offered the following suggestions:

- 1. Let deaf individuals fully participate in every conversation.
- 2. Consider allowing the children to sign. Signing did not hurt my speech.
- 3. Let deaf children interact with successful deaf adults.
- 4. Teach them to express their feelings.

We thank her and hope that our discussions will help us provide a better education for all of our children.

WINTER CAMP







Eight young men and women will confess their faith in the Rite of Confirmation here at Detroit on Pentecost, May 18. We rejoice that God has led these children to this moment of responsibility. Our Confirmation policy at the School has been changed this year. We hope that all of these children will be back next year. In the past, they always left after Confirmation. Now we hope to have them for, at least, one more year for additional education and for an opportunity for them to learn what it means to be a responsible member of the Church. Our congratulations to all of them.

March 18, thirty-five of our children had the joyous opportunity of watching the Ice Capades. A beloved friend who wishes to remain anonymous provided this treat, together with some banana splits for our children. Many of the children were enthralled with the beautiful costumes and the elaborate patterns created by the skaters.

As a way to evaluate the progress of our children and to determine if they are ready to be integrated into hearing-impaired or regular schools, we have begun a new testing program. We are evaluating the abilities and achievements of our students both academically and socially. Then during our interviews with the parents, we are discussing where the child might most profitably be educated in the coming years.

Kim Hurdelbrink, a former student from Sebawing, recently won an art award. Our congratulations on this achievement.

One of the purposes for our Communication Seminars is to reexamine our goals. So far, we have reached three conclusions. 1. There is a need for a Christian Residential School today in America. 2. We dedicate ourselves to a complete Christ-centered education, an education which helps us make sense out of all the magnificent challenges God daily offers us. 3. We must offer the highest quality education to make sure that our children receive sufficient knowledge and background information to communicate intelligently with their families and peers.
