LEE AND THE LION

Thanks be to God for His protection.

On February 10, Caesar, a two year old, four hundred pound lion, visited the Lutheran School for the Deaf. He was invited for two reasons: One, publicity; and two, an opportunity for our children to learn to respect an animal.

Obviously, we got far too much publicity. Pictures of Caesar and Lee were shown on television throughout all of the United States and Western Europe.

We also had an excellent learning experience. Travelogues and nature shows on television are wonderful for hearing people but most of the information is carried by sound. Sometime turn off the sound on your T.V. set and see what you learn from a travelogue.

Deaf children need many experiences from which they can learn visually the same concepts that you and I learn by listening and so we must carefully evaluate every opportunity for learning. With Caesar we learned something but not exactly what we had planned.

We learned again to give thanks for God's great protective power.

Caesar was brought to the school about 10 o'clock that morning. He had been fed and was quiet. On many other occasions, other children had petted him and even ridden on his back.

He was here for about an hour. The little children first came into the room, touched him and went over and sat down and their teachers led them in an educational experience. They learned what he ate, how he slept and many other facts about him. They saw him do some of his tricks.

Then, the little children began to leave the room and they were invited one more time to "pet" the lion.

The children gathered around, touched him for about one half a inute, then suddenly, without warning, and without provocation,

Caesar turned and took Lee Kowalsky into his mouth.

While Caesar did not bite down, his teeth did break the skin on Lee's body, as some of you saw on nation-wide television.

We thank God for the quick thinking action of the trainer and all of the other adults in the room.

Even more, we thank God for His protection of Lee. Lee was in the hospital for about 30 hours. She then was released and stayed with her parents for about a week. Since then, she has been back at the School eagerly learning.

A few days before Caesar's visit, the School had finally received its new video-tape equipment. As part of the Centennial offering, three years ago, we determined to buy a video-tape recorder. This allows our children to see themselves. It allows them to capture an experience and look at it again and again.

Our video-tape recording of the incident allowed us to spend some time with the children and teach them how to properly respect the "king of beasts." The children were able to learn what we had planned.

We also again learned anew what it means when it is written "all things work together for good, to them that love God."

Lee is well and is curious as always. Lee remembers, as we all do, the lion. Like us, Lee thanks God that His love protected her.



One of the major purposes of the conferences is to discuss the learning progress of the child to date and to begin to plan for future schooling after the child leaves here. We attempt to honestly evaluate all of the potential strengths of the child. Then we evaluate the local educational opportunities in the child's home area. Finally, we begin to project when the child may again participate in local school programs. We seek to provide the best education for each child entrusted to us. Sometimes that means that we must recommend that the child go to another school to receive a kind of education which we are unable to provide. We thank the parents for their cooperation in these conferences.

Our enrollment continues to slowly decline. We have room for more students. If you know any parents of deaf children, encourage them to consider sending their child here. We offer the very best education that we possibly can, together with that magnificent plus of sharing Jesus Christ in and through everything that we do with the children.
