

Every morning, the children divide into three groups and have chapel in their various areas to praise God and to hear again the Word of Life which so wonderfully feeds our faith. On Fridays, they all meet together in one large group in the main church.

All of the children, as they become older, also are involved in the Confirmation process. Our Principal, Mr. William Harlow, teaches the first Confirmation Class in which they study Bible History. Rev. Clark Bailey, of Our Savior's Lutheran Church of the Deaf, comes in two days a week and leads the older children through Catechism Doctrine Study. This coming spring, four young people, pictured here on this page, will be confirmed and next year the four young people will be involved in Confirmation III Class with Pastor Rynearson, as they study what it means to belong to the Church.

The faces of faith are manifold. They are the faces of a houseparent, explaining God's will to the children when they behave in ways which God does not desire. It involves sharing the comfort of God's Good News, of Jesus' Resurrection for our forgiveness. It involves Sunday worship and a Sunday School provided by the local deaf congregation. It involves all those attempts to encourage all of us to act as the Faith-full people of God.



It Costs Too Much

Frequently we hear of a deaf child who is not attending our school because the parents feel it would cost too much to send their child here.

There is a terrible cost when a child receives an inadequate education. There is perhaps a disastrous cost if your child never really learns to know Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior.

The budget listed below shows that there is a tremendous cost to educating a deaf child. The small class size, the many visual aids and the special hearing equipment make this cost very necessary.

No parent is required to pay the full cost of educating their child at the Lutheran School for the Deaf. In fact, all that we do ask is that they be responsible parents.

Because of the great love of so many friends, we are able to continue this wonderful ministry. We rejoice that you have made it possible for some parents to entrust us with the Christian Education of their child.
