Two years ago, these young people began their confirmation instruction under our former Principal, Mrs. Pauline Fenton. This past year, they have been instructed by the Rev. Clark Bailey who conducted the Rite of Confirmation in Our Savior Lutheran Church which worships regularly in the Chapel at the Lutheran School for the Deaf.

All four of these young people will be returning next fall to the Lutheran School for the Deaf for one more year of study. Part of their study next year will be a post-confirmation course in what it means to belong to the congregation and how a congregation works together effectively.



Labels

On March 29th, the Lutheran School for the Deaf shipped a total of 162,425 labels to the Campbell Soup Company. Of those labels, 88,675 were donated by individuals and organizations all over the United States.

Because of the large number of labels that we received, we won a contest sponsored by Farmer Jack's, a local grocery store, and they gave us 20,000 more labels.

In addition, as a service project, we have forwarded 53,750 labels which were collected by the Lutheran Social Services Agency of Greater Detroit for use in their program.

Our labels were used to order 23 different items which includes projector carts; cassettes for tape recorders; many balls: footballs, basketballs, volleyballs, soccerballs; encyclopedias; some metric math lessons; all kinds of posters; and many other items. We hope to list and picture all the items in our summer ADVOCATE.

Our sincere thanks to all of you for your help.

Learning Disabled Classes

On April 18th, we began the third phase of our program with Learning Disabled Children. In the first phase, Mr. Pagels was hired to do some research and to begin some diagnostic evaluation of referred children. In the second phase, Mr. Pagels began to visit parochial schools in the Detroit area and to work with children and teachers there. Now we have five children enrolled in a special class at the Lutheran School for the Deaf. May God bless these classes as we at tempt to help these children fulfill their potential.

Karen Louise Anderson



Karen is a twelve-year-old young lady with a bubbling smile and continuous laughter who has been enrolled in our school for two years. Karen, in addition to being deaf, has some Cerebral Palsy and requires the use of crutches.

Unfortunately, as can occasionally happen, when Karen was young, someone misunderstood her and mis-diagnosed her. For awhile, it was thought that she was mentally retarded and so she was sent to a school for mentally retarded children.

However, it became apparent that Karen's major problem is deafness and, because of her deafness, the tests were incorrect.

Karen has above average intelligence and is an eager young lady. Our many steps prove no hindrance to her as she gladly goes on her way.

Because of a birth defect, muscles in Karen's legs are not strong enough. Recently she received surgery at Shriner's Crippled Children's Hospital in Chicago and this past week, her braces have arrived which enables her to walk much better. The hope is that, with some physical therapy, during the next year, she might be able to walk without her crutches.

Karen and her family live about four miles from the school and are members of Our Savior Lutheran Church on the East side of Detroit.

The Ephphatha Chapter of the Ladies Auxiliary for the Deaf, has been sponsoring Karen for two years by providing a Scholarship for her education. Our thanks to our ladies from the towns North of Detroit for their continued support of Karen. With them, we rejoice that she now has her braces and can walk better.

Service Clubs

Each year, Service Clubs in the Greater Detroit Area, provide many helpful services and gifts to the school to help the children in their educational program. Listed in alphabetical order.

Each year, Denby Kiwanis Club provides two very valuable programs for the Lutheran School for the Deaf. Dr. Owen Dueweke, one of their members, comes every Monday to help test the eyes of our children and to adjust their glasses. Because the children must depend so heavily upon their vision, it is absolutely important that their glasses be correct. Dr. Owen, and his father, Dr. Jerome before him, have been providing this service to the school for over forty-five years.

Secondly, the Denby Kiwanis Club, together with the Northeast Burbank Kiwanis Club, continues to provide funds for the athletic program held every Friday at the Northeast Y.M.C.A.

The Warren Kiwanis has provided the food, as well as the lockers and many other items.

The Eastside Lions Club continues to support the school with its gifts. Recently they again invited all their members to a tour and to see the children. One of their members, Mr. Freddie Meyer, has been active over the years supplying flowers to the school.
