It is hard to deal with other children who make fun of you. Jennifer had to deal with this frustration, and with the frustration of not being able to keep up with her class.

In September 1986, Jennifer started school at Lutheran School for the Deaf Special Education Ministries (LSDSEM). When she first started school, she had some problems with missing patches of hair caused by stress. Since she has been with LSDSEM, Jennifer has a full head of hair. She has a wonderful attitude toward her school work, and has made many friendships, not only with other students, but with teachers.

This school is a family. It has been a positive force for me as well. For the first time, I have come in contact with a school where you have a real personal friendship, a for the distribution of the school where they are concerned about doing the best for your child.

The atmosphere at the Lutheran School for the Deaf Special Education Ministries is positive, loving, and caring. Any time there is a problem, it is not too big of a problem that people will not come in and say, "What can we do?", "What do you need?" I love it, and the people that are in this ministry. When Jennifer was in the hospital, a teacher came to visit her, which showed

Jennifer that someone other than her parents cared for her. There are a lot of little things that may seem insignificant or small, but to Jennifer, these insignificant things are of major importance. Jennifer made great strides and continues to make progress. This year, Jennifer is a cheerleader at school, doing well, and loves her teacher.

Jennifer has grown physically, in knowledge, and in Christ. I am very thankful for the way the Lutheran School for the Deaf Special Education Ministries has helped my child.


### Campus Student

### **Reaching out** in 25 years of ministry

The Lutheran School for the Deaf Special Education Ministries announces James Pagels' celebration of 25 years in the teaching ministry. Jim was born near Woodlake, a small town in southwestern Minnesota. He was one of three children, the son of an elementary Lutheran school teacher and principal, Ernest Pagels. His boyhood home was Watertown, MN. Jim attended high school at Concordia Academy in St. Paul, MN, going from there to

Concordia Teacher's College, River Forest, Illinois.Upon graduation in 1964, Mr. Pagels was called to Redford Lutheran School in Detroit. He taught intermediate grades, coached sports, and was a youth leader.

Jim received his M.A. in 1970 from Wayne State University, Detroit, in Educational Psychology and an Educational Specialist degree in School and Community Psychology in 1979. He is certified in the areas of elementary education and learning disabilities, and additionally as a school psychologist.

In 1976, he was called to the Lutheran School for the Deaf to serve in the emerging learning disability program. He now serves in directing the consulting and evaluating services as Director of Ephphatha Institute.

In 1965, Jim married Doris Meyermann of Clinton, Iowa. She teaches kindergarten at Bethlehem Lutheran School in Roseville. The Pagels have two children. Mark is a sophomore at Central Michigan University and Michelle is a sophomore at Lutheran High School East.

The Pagels family are members of St. Thomas Lutheran Church in East Detroit. Jim is presently a leader in the Stephen's Ministry.

Mr. Pagels has also been a part-time instructor in learning disabilities at Wayne State University and has volunteered as a counselor at Centerpoint Crisis Center. He enjoys swimming, tennis, and continues to participate annually in the Detroit Free Press International Marathon.

# **Executive**



Special greetings to you. I wanted to take this opportunity to update you on two very important events for our ministry. First, I wanted to say thank you to all of those who responded to my request in the last Advocate to "Tell Me What You Think" about a name change for our ministry. After much prayerful thought and discussion, the board of directors has decided to recommend approval of the new name, Lutheran Special Education Ministries, to the delegates at the Annual Meeting on May 9, 1990.

Although an historic step in the 117 year history of our ministry, the precedent for name change was previously established in 1957 when the name Society of the

Evangelical Lutheran Deaf Mute Institute was changed to Lutheran School for the Deaf. Delegates saw the need for change.

We should all feel assured that name change does not mean services to deaf children have been discontinued; rather, the name Lutheran Special Education Ministries makes a more accurate and truthful statement about this ministry. We help hundreds of children with special learning needs, including some hearing impaired children, to obtain a Christian education so that they may be better prepared for earthly life and through God's grace have eternal life.

I will certainly keep you updated on the outcome of the decision reached at the May 9th association meeting. I am also very pleased to report that the Reverend Dr. Oswald C.J. Hoffmann, honorary Lutheran Hour speaker, will be the guest speaker for the dinner meeting.

Additionally, I wanted to share with you that our ministry is nearing completion of its bid to obtain National Lutheran School Accreditation offered through the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Board for Parish Services. As of this date, we have completed an extensive self study in eleven key areas of ministry. An eleven member visiting team of educational and church leaders from Michigan, New York, Illinois, and Nebraska have completed their evaluation. We will receive final word regarding our accreditation status this summer.

It's an understatement to say the school year thus far has been exciting; exhilarating would be more appropriate. Will this continue? I have no doubt. Please keep the children and all associated with this ministry in your prayers.

As a student at LSDSEM, I would like to thank God for helping me. If it wasn't for God the school wouldn't be here. I would also like to thank all the teachers I had throughout the years. They really taught me a lot, especially Mrs. Alberts. She taught me many subjects, including the Bible. She taught me how to look up Bible passages and how to read them. I would really like to thank her for sharing all those opportunities with me.

When I went to the school, I couldn't read. Now I can read so many words, and I can pronounce so many words. I would like to be a chef. This June I will graduate from Lutheran High East. I have been involved in one year of wrestling and three years of track.



When Jennifer first entered our program, she was afraid of learning because she

failed at her previous school. She was all stressed out, and she became nervous about learning, and her mother didn't know what to do. Three or four years later, Jennifer was enrolled at LSDSEM because she did have a learning disability. Since then, her mother has been ecstatic about her gains in self-confidence and self-esteem. I remember her telling me that she loved school, and her teacher. I also remember her mother telling me that she could really see Christ working in her life. Since then I know that Jennifer has had many other teachers, and every year she has experienced success. One day this fall, Jennifer made the comment to me, "I am doing really good. Look at my penmanship." Jenifer feels confident now about what she can accomplish. She believes in herself! I really think one of the major goals we have as teachers is to get these children to believe in themselves.

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## YOUR STAMP ON THIS ENVELOPE IS AN ADDITIONAL GIFT

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SECOND CLASS

From time to time, a question arises about the phrase above that appears on our envelopes designed for your gifts to be sent to us.

The United States Postal Service requires that we pay 30 cents for each piece of business reply mail that comes back to us. That is 25 cents for first class postage and 5 cents for maintaining a record of fees paid.

When you place a first class stamp on the envelope, we will continue to pay the 30 cent fee, but we later file a report along with the envelope containing the stamp for a full refund of the stamp value.

This process is accomplished with the use of volunteer effort. Among the volunteers involved is Mr. Al Brokop. He is also the individual responsible for address changes. When the USPS notifies us of an address change, we are charged 30 cents. This amounted to \$1,000.00 in 1989. We hope that readers would notify us of any changes

or duplications so we can keep our address list accurate. We hope to be good stewards of your gifts.

### "What Resource Room Means To Our School..."

The resource room through the Lutheran School for the Deaf Special Education Ministries has been able to broaden our ministry at Trinity.

In the past, when parents would apply for their children to come to our school, if the child had some kind of learning disability, there was no possible way that we could really help them. If it was a minor disability, we might be able to help through the public school district. If the disability required more than just a couple hours a week of special help, we just didn't have the ability to help this child.



So through the resource room, we have expanded into offering an education to a number of different kinds of children that we could not help in the past. Secondly, our teacher is a great resource person. Not only is she able to help those students that are learning disabled, but she is able to talk with teachers about problems that they are having with other students. She is able to give suggestions and ideas to help our teachers working with any child.

I think our resource room has expanded our opportunity to help more children receive a Christian education. We are thankful for this opportunity.
