LSEM NOW IN SOUTHWEST REGION

Children with special learning needs in Southern California, Arizona, and Nevada will be receiving help from Lutheran Special Education Ministries (LSEM) headquartered in Detroit, MI.

On Friday, July 16, 1999, LSEM signed a partnership agreement with California Lutheran University, ELCA; Concordia University, Irvine, CA, LCMS; Lutheran Schools of Southern California, ELCA and the Pacific Southwest District, LCMS.

The partners intend to begin providing special education services to the estimated 100 partnership schools in the 2000-2001 school year.

"It was truly an amazing day," says LSEM President/CEO Roger DeMeyere. "There were smiles all around. Some people were even crying with joy. You could just sense the excitement in the air. You could feel the Spirit of God moving in that room. It was wonderful."

The Director of School Ministries of the Pacific Southwest District, Rachel Klitzing, agrees. "The educators of the Lutheran schools in the Pacific Southwest District and I are tremendously excited about our partnership with LSEM! God has truly blessed the efforts of many who have worked to make this partnership a reality. Share Our Joy!

The article on the cover of this Advocate talks about our ministry's growth into a new place, enabling even more children with special learning needs to receive that Christian education. Reaching out and continuing to grow is a good thing. It's been said that the moment you stop growing is the moment you die. What's true of people is also true of organizations. (I'm glad I'm a part of an organization that's so alive!)

As I read that article on the cover, something else struck me, too. I wondered: Are we also growing within the regions we've been serving for years? Are we also enabling more children with special learning needs within these regions to receive a Christian education?

I then decided to do a little digging. With the help of my secretary, B.J., I came up with some interesting figures. Let

me share them with you.

In 1996 our folks in Illinois served 821 children. By 1999, they had served 1,154. *This was a 40.5% increase*.

But this is not a fluke. Take Michigan, for example. In Michigan, in 1996, we served a total of 530 children. Three years later, in 1999, we served 1,200 children. This was a 126% increase.

These increases were also repeated ministrated. In 1996, we serve to the otal of 1,956 children. By 1999, that number grew to 3,187, an overall increase of 62.9%.

So we have grown. We have grown into new regions. We have grown by serving new children. We have grown in our outreach.

To meet these need, our budget has grown, too. In 1996, our budget was \$1,896,000. Three years later, in 1999, our budget is \$3,200,550. This 68.8% increase represents the costs of serving more children -

teacher salary, textbooks, and computer programs, for example.
