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Agreement Establishes New Southcentral Region

Representatives of Lutheran Special Education Ministries, Concordia University at Austin, Texas (Concordia), and the Texas District, the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (Texas District), signed a consortium agreement on April 30 to form a partnership that will bring special education programs to Lutheran schools in Texas. The agreement became effective May 1.

With this agreement in place, children across Texas who struggle to learn will have the opportunity to receive a Christian education along with special education assistance.

On hand to sign the agreement were: Roger DeMeyere, president and chief executive officer of Lutheran Special Education Ministries; Texas District President James Linderman; and Robert Greene, interim president of Concordia.

The consortium agreement calls for Lutheran Special Education Ministries to provide special education programs and



services to Lutheran schools and congregations throughout the Texas District.

This partnership establishes the ministry's Southcentral Region, its sixth regional office. The other offices are located in Detroit, Mich. (Great Lakes Region); River Forest, Ill. (Midwest Region); Bronxville, N.Y. (Northeast Region); St. Paul, Minn. (Northcentral Region); and Van Nuys, Calif. (Southwest Region).

For its part in the consortium,

Concordia will provide space for the regional office. The Texas District will provide financial support and consultation regarding the establishment of Lutheran Special Education Ministries programs in Texas District Lutheran schools.

"What once was only a dream now is a reality," said DeMeyere. "I'm very excited about working in partnership with the Texas District and Concordia to open the doors of schools and congregations wider in ministry to serve children with special learning needs. To God be the glory!"

Real Life Lessons Learned at the Tiger Shop

Thanks to Lutheran Special Education Ministries teacher Michelle Melde and the help of some volunteers, students at Trinity First Lutheran School in Minneapolis, Minn., are learning some valuable lessons.

The Trinity First students enrolled in the Lutheran Special Education Ministries program operate the Tiger Shop. The store was established as an effort to support the school's total student Christian character development focus for the year.

Throughout each week, all students in the school earn tickets for accomplishing tasks such as coming to school prepared to participate in daily activities and having all homework assignments completed. On Friday afternoon, teachers may bring their classes or individual students to the store to redeem their tickets for items such as games, books and school supplies. The Lutheran Special Education Ministries students have the responsibility of organizing and setting up the store each Friday. They also assist the students with shopping.

The Tiger Shop was made possible with the help of some willing adults. A women's Bible study group donated the supplies for the store and an adult Lutheran Special Education Ministries volunteer is in charge of managing the ticket record-keeping system.

The shop has been very popular with students and teachers at Trinity First. A teacher shared that the shop supports her efforts to help students learn the skills needed to become more independent with their studies. Students are enthusiastic about shopping at the Tiger Shop, and some have said that earning the tickets has been an incentive to complete their homework.

Susan's report card changed from years of mostly Ds and Fs to a report card she was proud to take home – As, Bs and Cs. The change occurred in one quarter when she was in sixth grade.

What made the difference? A Lutheran Special Education Ministries teacher worked with Susan, teaching her organization and study skills. Susan loved the attention she received, but most of all, she responded to the praise she deserved as she changed her study habits.

Erick, a third grade student at St. John Lutheran School in Kendallville, Ind., wouldn't talk to many people except his closest friends. He had severe learning problems. Working intensely with Erick seemed to make the difference. Reading was very difficult for him. Learning to recognize letters and sound out words was a slow, steady process. By the end of the school year he could sound out words. But time was limited, as the school's Lutheran Special Education Ministries program was not a fulltime program.

The following school year, the principal increased the program to four full days a week. Erick has received more help; his self-esteem has skyrocketed; and he is starting to read on his own. He's even started reading chapter books.

God truly is working in marvelous ways through this program. The school should be commended for fulfilling its mission to help all children in their walk with Christ and in developing their academic skills.

Even Billy's handwriting has improved.

His successes are a tribute to God, the Phonics First Orton-Gillingham method of teaching, the support of his regular classroom teachers and the assistance he received in the resource room.
