Serving and Praising God...One Child at a Time

JILL'S STORY

Lutheran Special Education Ministries teacher, Arlene Lapsansky reflected back to when she was first introduced to Jill.

Lapsansky shared, "During Jill's primary years, she just kind of trudged along in school. It appeared to her classroom teacher and others that she was attentive, listening and seemed to be catching the information; however, little did anyone know, Jill had fooled them all."

Fortunately, before Jill entered the purth grade, her parents had her tested arrough the public school system. The results revealed that she was visually impaired, and due to this impairment she had extreme difficulty organzing visual information. Following the testing, Lutheran Special Education Ministries (LSEM) services were called upon and answered in the form of LSEM teacher Arlene Lapsansky. Arlene immediately coordinated to have the Vision Itinerant Services (Pediatric Optometrist) through the public school system and a vision consultant come to Trinity Lutheran School, in order to accomodate for Jill's needs. All those years, Jill had had difficulty seeing the board, words projected by the overhead projector, and she also had difficulty seeing smaller typeface such as captions under photographs. Lapsansky shares, "Our special needs team of professionals instituted such changes as making sure he words projected by the overhead were always in black and the classroom computer screen's font size was enlarged as well. Jill still attends Trinity Lutheran School. She is now a Junior

High student and her whole world has opened up to her, thanks to the intervention techniques that were put into place by her LSEM teacher.

This success story is of one child who was helped by our teacher, Arlene, while serving at Trinity Lutheran School. Lutheran Special Education Ministries teacher, Arlene Lapsansky helps approximately twenty special needs children each week on a regular basis with their individual learning needs at Trinity Lutheran School. LSEM serves special learning needs children

(students) in Christian schools and churches all across the United States, and the need for our services is on the rise. We know approximately one child out of every five has a special learning need. Our programs and services allow children to develop the skills they need to lead productive lives throughout their academic careers, and the opportunity to develop a life-long relationship with their Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Since 1873, when the Lutheran School for the Deaf began ministering to children who were hearing impaired, our ministry has been faithfully meeting our mission: "With the knowledge of God's love and the desire that God's love be revealed through our ministry, Lutheran Special Education Ministries serves to enable children with special learning needs to receive a Christian education." Today, we continue to honor our commitment by *Serving and Praising God...One Child at a Time*.

Special Notes from the desk of Roger DeMeyere



A Time to Grow Again: And How!

A Time to Grow Again: And How! That's the title of a paper I wrote recently

to serve as a catalyst for change within Lutheran Special Education Ministries. We need to reverse a very troubling (albeit expected) pattern of partnership school attrition during the past several years. The bottom line result is we are helping less children than we did three years ago. That's the bad news!

What's the good news? First, we need to keep the bad news in context. Even with recent service reductions Lutheran Special Education Ministries is still much larger than it was a decade ago. From 1996-2002 Lutheran Special Education Ministries experienced dramatic growth, doubling in size from 50 to 100 partnership schools. (Partnership schools are Lutheran or other Christian schools who have contracted with Lutheran Special Education Ministries to provide special education services to their school.) During those years services expanded beyond Michigan, Illinois and New York to include placement of our special education staff in schools in Fort Wayne, Minneapolis, Los Angeles, Phoenix, Dallas and Houston. And as a result we were helping more than 3,000 children a year.

Second, like other organizations Lutheran Special Education Ministries has been forced to downsize. But how can this be good news? Only if we use a scriptural reference point. Branches need to be pruned to bear new fruit. I believe the financial struggles of the past have made us better stewards of our time, talent and treasure. I also believe we are

uniquely positioned for such a time as this to grow again. Positioned to bear new fruit. And I believe we will. Recently the Florida-Georgia District LCMS asked us to bring our special education services to the Lutheran schools in Florida and Georgia. We plan to have our teachers and consultants placed in schools in Orlando this year. Wonderful! And our staff informed me that all current service areas expect to expand to new schools for 2006-07. Exciting!

Although we've had our challenges the future looks bright, perhaps even brighter than before. I wonder if Lutheran Special Education Ministries will double in size again during the next decade? Stay tuned!

Around The Ministry

Great Lakes Region

The Great Lakes Region has been full of activity during the first half of this year. Twenty-seven teachers have worked with over 500 students in various settings. More students are referred for services each week. It is an honor to work with the students, parents, and classroom teachers.

Our staff has been attending and presenting at conferences. Many teachers have learned new techniques and gained additional skills in identifying students with needs and meeting those needs. Regional director, Kathleen Hodges was able to present three workshops. Over 100 church workers learned about working with struggling students.

LSEM was very honored to receive a grant that allowed one of our partnership schools to increase their program. Thanks to this generous grant, Cornerstone, Iroquois, in Detroit now has a teacher for half a day.

We are looking ahead to the next thool year and are very excited to see the hope of more children being served!

Midwest Region

Lutheran Special Education Ministries joined with Voice of Care (VOC) Ministry and Bethesda Lutheran Homes and Services to host a workshop at St. John Lutheran Church in LaGrange, Illinois.

The workshop was designed to train Christians who want to reach and teach children and adults with developmental disabilities. Workshop participants included teachers (both professional and volunteer), family members and friends of a person with special needs, as well as pastors and other church workers intent on the involvement of people with developmental disabilities in the life of the church. Susan Lewis, director for Lutheran Special Education Ministries' Midwest Region presented "Basics for Christian Special Education."

By the end of the day participants were equipped with steps and strategies to reach and teach God's Word to children and adults with developmental disabilities.

Northcentral Region

The strength of the LSEM program in Minnesota continues to be the services provided by five very dedicated teachers at the five partnership schools. This past fall direct services have been provided to 95 students with an additional 13 students participating in the consultant program. The psychological assessment program has increased with two student assessments completed and a third one in process of being completed. The services of Concordia University professor and school psychologist Sally Baas have greatly assisted in the success of this achievement.

Interest in the LSEM program continues to grow. A total of 230 individuals have attended or participated in meetings or workshops presented by LSEM staff. An additional 43 school contacts have been made.

Plans are presently being made to have a major fundraiser event in cooperation with the St. Paul Saints baseball team. This is shaping up to be a fun time for families and at the same time support for LSEM.

Southcentral Region

The Southcentral Region is branching out into new, exciting territory! Juhl Gardiner is running a successful speech and language program at Crown of Life Lutheran School in Colleyville, Texas. Juhl often pulls students out of the classroom to give instruction one-on-one or in small groups. Many times, Juhl works alongside general education teachers and assists students in their self-contained classroom.

Sharon Messmann, our coordinator in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, attended two conferences this fall. These conferences inspired her to start an exciting new initiative of academic competitions. These competitions will motivate students who may struggle in language-based subjects, but shine in math, calculator applications, art, music or drama. In addition, Sharon plans to address the needs of children who are gifted/talented.

Martin Herzog, our coordinator in the Houston area, attended four conferences where he was able to give presentations to numerous principals. Many of these principals had never heard of LSEM before. LSEM regained one new Lutheran school, Memorial Lutheran, Houston. We are currently looking for qualified teachers in this region.

Southeast Region

But before initiating on site services to any area of the country Lutheran Special Education Ministries seeks the partnership of the LCMS district. The Consortium Agreement delineates the responsibilities of the participating organizations. We expect the agreement will be signed in February, 2006. Then, what once was only a dream will be a reality. To God alone be the glory!
