
Straight From The Heart

I began working with Elizabeth in first grade. She had a difficult time learning to read and she was a very busy young lady. Her mother worked with her for hours every night making sure she did all of her homework. Elizabeth was very motivated to work hard and accomplish much but she needed extra help.

In second grade she became one of my students in the LSEM Resource Room. Through hard work and determination, she is now an honor student and is taking college prep courses.

Recently, she wrote an essay about her love for horses and her pursuit to someday have her own horse like her grandmother who died of cancer. The essay was so moving and so eloquently written that it touched all of our hearts.

In her essay she wrote about Duchess, her horse, and how he helped her through a sad time during her grandmother's illness. Elizabeth writes, "I funneled all of my pain into my relationship with Duchess." Elizabeth's grandmother died one month

after she was diagnosed with cancer. The loss of her grandmother was very painful but she knew her grandmother wanted her to keep working hard and be all that God intended her to be.

I believe the experience of losing someone she loved gave Elizabeth the courage to endure even more pain when she had to make the decision to end Duchess' life because of a severe leg injury. She writes in her essay, "During that period in my life I learned how the bond and love between a child and their horse can help them get through tough times." Elizabeth learned many valuable life lessons during that difficult time and as her LSEM Teacher so did I. There's no doubt that the love she had for her grandmother and her horse was "straight from the heart!"

I believe that Elizabeth will do very well as she moves on to high school. However, if not for the LSEM program at her school, Elizabeth may not have received the help she needed early on and would probably not be reading and writing at a level that will help her to succeed in high school. Our mission is to reach out to children that may learn differently than you or I. This difference could manifest itself in hearing, speech, vision, motion or even perception. God continues to prepare LSEM to move forward with timely and appropriate programs and services to children.

Our knowledge base comes from both our history and the years of education and experience of our professional teaching staff. We have the lessons learned from our history of caring for one population of His special children as "The Lutheran School for the Deaf;" we did that well for over 100 years. But as avenues were opened to the Deaf students to live at home, our mission moved to enabling all children that learn differently, to know Jesus.

We have been reaching out beyond Detroit to serve children of this larger population with state of the art education and techniques for over 35 years, at an average rate of 2000 children per year. I personally pray that God allows me to reach one child at a time...but he gives this ministry 2000 fold. What a blessing!

Right now times are difficult, we cannot reach out to as many children because many Christian schools and churches don't have the resources to partner with us. So please take a moment to talk to God and your friends about LSEM and think about these questions:

- **Do you pray for LSEM?** Above all, please pray.
- Is your school or church partnering with LSEM? If so, please consider supporting that program. Most programs do not adequately meet the needs of the children.

- Can you give a gift? Consider a personal gift to support our service to children.

Many participants, which included pastors, teachers and administrators, were made aware of the challenges individuals with disabilities face by participating in these various hands on activities.
